- 2. Authorise officers to amend the QLDC Draft Waste Minimisation and Management Plan 2018 based on deliberations post hearings.

Title

Background

- 2 Queenstown Lakes District Council has a statutory responsibility to promote effective and efficient waste minimisation and management within the Queenstown Lakes District. In order to do this, the Council is required to adopt a Waste Minimisation and Management Plan (WMMP/the Plan) in accordance with the Waste Minimisation Act 2008 (the Act) Sections 43 and 44.
- 3 In preparing, amending, or revoking a WMMP, Council must; consider the following methods of waste management and minimisation (listed in descending order of importance):
 - (i) reduction
 - (ii) reuse
 - (iii) recycling
 - (iv) recovery
 - (v) treatment
 - (vi) disposal

and ensure that the collection, transport, and disposal of waste does not, or is not likely to, cause a nuisance; and have regard to the New Zealand Waste Strategy, or any government policy on waste management and minimisation that replaces the strategy; and have regard to the most recent assessment undertaken by the territorial authority under section 51; and use the special consultative procedure set out in section 83 of the Local Government Act 2002 and, in doing so, the most recent assessment undertaken by the territorial authority under section 51 must be notified with the statement of proposal.

- 4 Council's existing WMMP 2011 was due for review by December 2017. The Ministry for the Environment provided guidance to ensure statutory obligations were met in regards to the timing of the review and adoption of a new plan process. The review process has met these requirements.
- 5 The QLDC Waste Assessment and WMMP review commenced in February 2017. The review included stakeholder working group meetings together with; elected members, service providers and contractors, Council officers, specialist solid waste consultants and Central Otago District Council representation.
- 6 QLDC's Infrastructure Committee were briefed on the progress in workshops throughout the development of the draft Plan.

Consultation

- 7 To enable efficiency of consultation and alignment with proposed funding in the Ten Year Plan (TYP), the QLDC Executive Leadership Team endorsed that the draft WMMP 2018 be consulted concurrently with the TYP 2018/28.
- 8 The draft WMMP was reviewed by Public Health South and endorsement of the Plan was received by the Medical Officer of Health in February 2018.

- 9 Attachment A QLDC Draft Waste Minimisation and Management Plan 2018 was publically consulted during 23 March 30 April 2018. Supporting information included Attachment B QLDC Waste Assessment. The Waste Assessment includes all programme options considered by the working party. The draft WMMP 2018 presents Council's preferred programme option.
- 10 To meet the requirements of the Local Government Act, the draft Plan underwent a special consultative procedure. This included; hard copies of the draft Plan and Statement of Proposal available at Council facilities (offices and libraries), an online survey and submission feedback form, social media notifications, advertising of the process in local newspapers and community newsletters, promotion on the Council website, direct email to targeted community groups and a media advisory resulting in a newspaper article.
- 11 During the consultation period, the Council's Senior Waste Minimisation Planner and Infrastructure Chair attended an event hosted by Sustainable Queenstown. The free public event included a presentation on zero waste and provided an opportunity for participants to ask questions on the draft Plan.
- 12 At closure of the consultation period, a total of 199 completed submissions were received and are attached **Appendix C Submissions.**
- 13 The results of the online survey are attached **Appendix D Online Survey.**
- 14 To help consider the submission feedback, officer comments are noted in a copy of the WMMP's action plan attached **Appendix E Draft WMMP Action Plan.** The officer comments include the level of support demonstrated in the submissions for each action proposed in the draft Plan.
- 15 The following actions represent the key additions and focus areas in the proposed draft Plan 2018 from Councils current WMMP programme:
 - Implement changes to the glass recycling methodology to increase quality, quantity and yield and introduce consistency between Wards.
 - Introduce Council provided organic waste collection for urban households.
 - Provide an organic waste processing facility.
 - Use additional languages to aid in communication and education of services.
 - Support and enable private operators in the private development of a construction and demolition waste facility.
 - Investigate the reconfiguration of the Wakatipu and Wanaka sites to encourage diversion of reusable and recyclable materials from landfill.
 - Provide public place recycling bins co-located with litter bins.
 - Implement enhancements to biosolids end-use e.g. co-composting, solar drying, incineration, monofill, land application.
 - Monitor quality and quantity of construction and demolition waste.

- Investigate regulatory tools to support management of health care wastes.
- Review the need and purpose of a solid waste bylaw.
- 16 The remaining actions in the draft WMMP 2018 are a continuation of the existing programme.

Comment

Submission feedback

- 17 The key issues identified and actions supported across the submissions are grouped into the following themes; Waste Reduction, Resource Recovery and Waste Disposal. This supports the intent of the Waste Minimisation Act to consider options in priority order e.g. reduction, reuse, recycling, recovery, treatment, disposal.
- 18 The following overview identifies the key actions that the submissions seek and support;

19 Waste Reduction - Reducing waste at source

Educate – Engage and support businesses, residents and visitors in behaviour change to minimise waste creation e.g. through waste minimisation education, learning opportunities and community outreach. Provide subsidies and learning opportunities for home composting. Facilitate an advisory group made up of QLDC, ORC, industry and community to support waste reduction initiatives. Provide a waste minimisation contestable fund for community groups to access.

Advocate – Demonstrate leadership by using political lobbying power to support the Government to implement existing tools in the Waste Minimisation Act such as; 'Product stewardship schemes' and 'Container deposit legislation'. Support national initiatives and strategic campaigns such as the Local Government Waste Manifesto.

Regulate - Enforce tools and policies to minimise waste created at public events and during building and construction processes. Implement a ban or tools to reduce the use of single use plastics including; drink straws, plastic bags, plastic cutlery, plastic bottles and take away takeaway cups.

20 Resource Recovery – Diverting waste from landfill

Provide glass recycling services through drop off points and improved collection services to ensure glass is not disposed of in landfill. Enable glass back to glass recycling.

Establish kerbside collection services for food and garden organic waste.

Provide services so that commercial food providers minimise food waste.

Provide soft plastics (low density polyethylene) recycling opportunities.

Provide accessible and convenient recycling drop off points for public and business for recyclable materials.

Provide public place recycling and rubbish bins.

Provide textile and clothing drop off facilities.

Provide polystyrene recycling options.

Replicate the community model of resource recovery in Wanaka in the Wakatipu.

Promote and encourage correct use of kerbside bin collection services and drop off points to minimise; contaminated recyclables, public nuisance, littering and fly tipping.

Support opportunities to divert reusable and recoverable materials from landfill including; electrical goods, construction waste materials, reusable goods and materials.

Support appropriate services and promote information to ensure electronic waste, batteries, medical waste, tyres, whiteware, used oil, agricultural chemicals and common household hazardous wastes are treated, recycled or disposed in a way that minimises harm.

21 Waste Disposal – Collecting, transporting and disposing of waste

Provide convenient and accessible facilities and collection services to dispose of waste including kerbside collection and drop off facilities such as transfer stations.

Ensure availability of landfill space into the future is maintained.

- 22 The online survey responses indicated a high level of support for Council's preferred programme to focus on glass and organics. It also indicated a high level of support for increasing the level of information and education about waste minimisation.
- 23 The response to the four key questions that indicate support for Council's preferred programme and a need for increased education follows;
 - 82% of respondents agree with QLDC's preferred focus on recycling and glass services
 - 75% of respondents would use a kerbside collection service for garden and food waste
 - 99% of respondents support a change of approach to glass collection in the district
 - 95% of respondents would like to see more information and education about waste minimisation
- 24 Overall the response to the draft Plan indicates that the community are largely supportive of Council's preferred programme with the exception of the proposed level of waste minimisation education.
- 25 Once the submissions and deliberations have been completed it is recommended that staff amend the plan to incorporate any changes recommended by Council as a result of the submission process.
- 26 A number of improvements have also been identified due to inaccuracies or opportunities to improve the intent of the draft Plan. It is recommended that staff amend the draft Plan accordingly before the final version is put forward to Council for adoption. These include; improvements to the format, intention, reporting methods and language to shift mind-set away from waste management to waste minimisation.

Options

- 27 This report identifies and assesses the following reasonably practicable options for assessing the matter as required by section 77 of the Local Government Act 2002:
- 28 Option 1 Consider verbal and written submissions to the draft Plan and amend the draft Plan based on post consultation deliberations.
 - 29 Advantages: This option will; meet the statutory requirements of the Waste Minimisation Act, build on the previous plan's goals; prioritise a number of actions and provide opportunity for community engagement through the consultation process.
 - 30 Disadvantages: Further staff review and amendments will be required before the final plan can be delivered for Council adoption.
- 31 Option 2 Consider verbal and written submissions and adopt the QLDC Waste Minimisation and Management Plan 2018 as put out for consultation.
 - 32 Advantages: Minimal review work required by staff.
 - 33 Disadvantages: This option is supportable, but is not recommended as the draft Plan is likely to benefit from amendments based on the public consultation process and further review by Council.
- 34 Option 3 Do nothing. Continue operating under the QLDC Waste Minimisation and Management Plan 2011.
 - 35 Advantages: This option is not supportable. The Waste Minimisation Act 2008 requires a review process, adoption and implementation of a Council's WMMP every six years.
 - 36 Disadvantages: This option is not supportable. Legislative requirements necessitate that the WMMP be reviewed with regard to the most recent Waste Assessment. Council's existing plan is based on information in the QLDC Waste Assessment 2011.
- 37 The Waste Minimisation Act 2008 requires a review, adoption and implementation of a Council's Waste Minimisation and Management Plan is undertaken every six years.
- 38 This report recommends Option 1 for addressing the matter because it will meet all statutory requirements of the WMA, encourages community engagement in the final Plan and is based on the information in QLDC's current Waste Assessment.

Significance and Engagement

39 This matter is of medium significance, as determined by the Council's Significance and Engagement Policy principally because of its importance to the district, the community interest, impact on the environment, culture and people.

- 40 The draft Plan's review, consultation and hearings process will contribute to robust Council decision making when the final Waste Minimisation and Management Plan 2018 is considered for adoption.
- 41 The funding proposed in the draft Ten Year Plan will allow for the work proposed in the draft WMMP 2018 to be implemented.
- 42 A special consultative procedure was undertaken to meet the requirements of the Local Government Act and Waste Minimisation Act.
- 43 The recommended option is consistent with the vision, principles and objectives as set out in the current WMMP 2011.

Risk

- 44 This matter relates to the strategic risk 'SR1, Current and future development needs of the community including environmental protection', as documented in the Council's risk register. The risk is classed as high. The development of the Council's WMMP relates to this risk due to its requirement to meet statutory responsibilities to promote effective and efficient waste management and minimisation within the district.
- 45 The risks associated with the Plan are minimised through the stakeholder engagement in the Plan's development, the Plan's review process, the consultation with Public Health South and the public consultation process.
- 46 To minimise the risk, it is important that the process of developing the Plan, including; obtaining and deliberating on public feedback is a robust process.
- 47 The funding in the draft Ten Year Plan will allow for the work in the draft WMMP 2018 to be implemented.
- 48 This process will meet Council's statutory responsibilities to promote effective and efficient waste management and minimisation within the district.

Financial Implications

- 49 Funding in the draft Ten Year Plan has been proposed to implement the actions in the draft WMMP as put out for consultation.
- 50 The following Council plans and strategies were considered:
 - QLDC Waste Minimisation and Management Plan 2011
 - QLDC Waste Assessment 2018
 - QLDC Draft Ten Year Plan 2018/28
- 51 The recommended option is consistent with the principles set out in the above documents.
- 52 This matter is included in the draft Ten Year Plan.

Local Government Act 2002 Purpose Provisions

53 The recommended option:

- Will help meet the current and future needs of communities for good-quality local infrastructure, local public services, and performance of regulatory functions in a way that is most cost-effective for households and businesses:
- Can be implemented through current funding under the Ten Year Plan;
- Is consistent with the Council's plans and policies; and
- Would not alter significantly the intended level of service provision for any significant
 activity undertaken by or on behalf of the Council, or transfer the ownership or control
 of a strategic asset to or from the Council.

Consultation: Community Views and Preferences

- 54 The persons who are affected by or interested in this matter are the district's residents, businesses and visitors. The level of consultation is correctly aligned to the guidance provided by the Significance and Engagement Policy.
- 55 The Council has a statutory obligation to consult using the Special Consultative Procedure when adopting or amending a WMMP. Accordingly, the following dates are the key milestones in leading to the adoption of the WMMP:

23 March – 30 April 2018	Public consultation of draft WMMP and supporting information
16 May 2018	Submissions to the draft WMMP heard by full Council in Wanaka
17 May 2018	Submissions to the draft WMMP heard by full Council in Queenstown
28 June 2018	Council adopts the WMMP 2018 including revisions made arising from the consultation process

Legal Considerations and Statutory Responsibilities

- 56 Queenstown Lakes District Council has a statutory responsibility to promote effective and efficient waste management and minimisation within the Queenstown Lakes District (Section 42, WMA 08). In order to do this, the Council is required to adopt a WWMP under Section 44 of the Act.
- 57 In preparing, amending, or revoking a WMMP, Council must; consider the following methods of waste management and minimisation (listed in descending order of importance): reduction, reuse, recycling, recovery, treatment, disposal and ensure that the collection, transport, and disposal of waste does not, or is not likely to, cause a nuisance; and have regard to the New Zealand Waste Strategy, or any government policy on waste management and minimisation that replaces the strategy; and have regard to the most recent assessment undertaken by the territorial authority under section 51; and use the special consultative procedure set out in section 83 of the Local Government Act 2002 and, in doing so, the most recent assessment undertaken by the territorial authority under section 51 must be notified with the statement of proposal.

1 Introduction

Queenstown Lakes District Council (Council) has a statutory responsibility to promote effective and efficient waste management and minimisation within the Queenstown Lakes District (Section 42, Waste Minimisation Act 2008 (WMA)). In order to do this, the Council is required to adopt a waste management and minimisation plan (WMMP) under Section 43 of the Act.

This WWMP is a guiding document which identifies Council's vision, goals, objectives, targets and methods for achieving effective and efficient waste management and minimisation. It also provides information on how Council intends to fund the activities of the WMMP over the next six years.

In addition to the legislative framework in which this WMMP has been developed, it has also been developed in the context of the New Zealand Waste Strategy 2010 (NZWS) and its two goals of:

- Goal 1: Reducing the harmful effects of waste
- Goal 2: Improving the efficiency of resource use.

Council has also considered the waste minimisation hierarchy of reduce, reuse, recycle, recover, treatment and disposal in the development of this WMMP.

This WMMP should be read in association with Council's Waste Assessment (WA) which is attached as Appendix A to this WMMP.

2 Vision, goals, objectives and targets

Working together, Council and the community can achieve more effective and efficient waste management and minimisation in the District. Council is proposing the following vision, goals, objectives and targets. Taken together these form the strategy for Council's WMMP.

2.1 Vision for the future

Our vision for the future is:

"Towards zero waste and a sustainable district"

2.2 Goals, objectives and targets

The goals that we will use are those from the New Zealand Waste Strategy:

- Improving the efficiency of resource use
- Reducing harmful effects of waste.

2.2.1 Our objectives

Our objectives to meet our goals are:

3 The waste situation

3.1 Overview of existing waste management and minimisation infrastructure and services

A summary of the current services provided by Council and non-council providers is outlined below. For a detailed description of Council and non-council solid waste services, refer to Appendix 2 - Waste Assessment.

3.1.1 Services provided by Council

Council waste services and facilities include:

- Kerbside refuse collection using council approved bags and wheelie bins
- Rural refuse collection points
- Kerbside recycling collection
- Rural recycling drop off facilities
- Transfer stations Frankton (Queenstown) and Wanaka acceptance of waste and acceptance, sorting and storage of recyclable materials, public drop off facilities for recycling and green waste, tyres and scrap metal
- Wakatipu Recycling Centre Material Recovery Facility operated by Smart Environmental Ltd under Build Own Operate and Transfer contract. Owned and operated by Smart Environmental on a site owned by Council
- Victoria Flats landfill owned by Queenstown Lakes District Council, operated by SCOPE under Build Own Operate and Transfer contract. Accepts waste from the Queenstown Lakes and Central Otago Districts.
- Rural greenwaste drop off points in Glenorchy, Kingston, Luggate, Hawea and Makorara
- Hazardous waste drop off services for residential quantities of hazardous waste at the Frankton transfer station
- Biosolids disposal / processing
- Provision and servicing of litter bins and public place recycling bins
- Waste minimisation education/initiatives and programmes
- Inorganic collections in Glenorchy, Makarora and Kingston
- Subsidised home composting initiative "Bokashi" Bins
- Monitoring and maintenance of nine closed landfills.

3.1.2 Non-council provided services and facilities

Private companies continue to provide user charges services to meet additional requirements of the community. The following services are known to be provided:

- Private collection services for refuse and recycling for residential and commercial customers, including skip bin services for construction and demolition waste
- Collection of divertible material recyclables and green waste, including soft plastics and bottle banks
 - by private companies
 - by community groups/enterprise

- Cleanfill sites
- Wanaka Wastebusters recycling resale shop

3.2 Public health protection

The range of public and private waste services in the Queenstown Lakes District and Otago Region ensures public health will be adequately protected in the future. Council owns a landfill that is currently meeting its needs. The community currently has adequate access to council or privately-owned drop-off and collection services for refuse, recycling, greenwaste, hazardous waste and litter, but further waste minimisation is achievable as outlined in this Plan. This plan proposes services for better waste minimisation.

In its feedback on the Queenstown Lakes District Council Waste Assessment, the Southern District Health Board stated that following the review of the draft plan in 2017, Public Health South requested further information on: the life of the landfill, the desirability of increasing the amount of diverted construction and demolition waste; the inclusion of timeframes/targets for proposed actions and the importance of ongoing evaluation. Further explanation as to why business case option 6 was the preferred option was also suggested. This feedback has been considered in the development of this plan.

3.3 Summary of the volume and composition of waste and diverted materials

Extrapolating from the 2016 Solid Waste Analysis Protocol audit (SWAP) the Council is currently sending approximately 33,748 tonnes (t) of waste to the Victoria Flats landfill per year. Around 22,412t is from transfer stations, 2,132t is from Council kerbside collections, 2,652t is glass from the Wakatipu Recycling Centre and 5,044 from general waste. More detailed information about the district's waste and its composition is provided in the Appendix A - Waste Assessment.




Figure 1 Victoria Flats landfill waste flows – July and August 2016 (2016 SWAP)




Figure 2 Waste quantities (tonnes) sent to Victoria Flats landfill from Queenstown Lakes District 2003-2016

Figure 2 shows the amount of waste generated by the Queenstown Lakes District that is disposed at the Victoria Flats landfill. From 2003 to 2008 there was an increase in the amount of waste going to the landfill, however, this

dropped back to just under 2003 levels in 2012 as a result of a slowdown in economic activity following the Global Financial Crisis. Since 2012 there has been a steady increase in waste from the District going to the landfill, and in 2016 it is at its highest recorded. This increase aligns with the significant growth (currently~10% per annum) experienced in the District, the recent landfilling of glass and the 100,000+ visitors to the district in 2015/16.

The landfill has capacity to around 2045 and is not an immediate driver for this Plan. The focus is to improve the efficiency of resource use and reduce the harmful effects of waste to move towards zero waste and a sustainable district.

Council has a target in its current Long Term Plan (2015) to reduce the amount of residential waste to landfill per resident head of population from a baseline of 188kg (June 2014) to less than 160kg for the 2016/17 financial year, and reducing again to 155kg in the 2017/18 financial year. However, there was an increase in residential waste to landfill in 2015/16 to 258kg. This can be explained by the recent landfilling of glass and as a result of the 100,000+ visitors to the district in 2015/16. In no way can this be attributed solely to the resident population. Therefore more representative targets to track performance are proposed in the LTP18.




Figure 3 Primary composition of Victoria Flats landfill waste from Queenstown Lakes District (from 2016 Survey report)

Figure 3 gives the waste composition breakdown of the types of waste entering the Victoria Flats landfill from the Queenstown Lakes District. Timber was the largest component with 18.9% of the total by weight. Organic material was the next highest component at 16%, and rubble close behind at 15.3% of total weight.

3.3.1 Diverted material

Diverted materials are those predominantly from kerbside recycling collection services, from drop off facilities for recycling and green waste and, re-use shops. The Annual Report 2015/2016 indicates that diverted from landfill increased from 226kg to 260kg per head of population from 2014/15 to 2015/16.




Figure 4 Queenstown Lakes District waste generated and waste diversion rate

Figure 4 shows the percentage of waste diverted. The figures prior to 2011/12 are taken from the 2012 Asset Management Plan (AMP). The underlying waste tonnage figures in the 2012 AMP were taken from different sources, however the historical figures still provide some comparison with the last five years.

Figure 4 shows that the amount of waste diverted has increased in recent years, however the total amount of waste generated has increased at a greater rate. This has resulted in a decrease in the diversion rate over the last five years. The SWAP has identified that there is potentially 53% of divertable material across the waste streams which presents a significant opportunity for Council to reduce divertable material going to landfill.

3.3.2 Sewage Treatment Residuals

The sludge from Council's waste water treatment plants is currently taken to AB Lime's landfill in Southland. Council is exploring other options to dispose of sludge and is currently trialling a vermicomposting solution as an alternative means of dealing with the sludge. The end product form the vermicomposting would be a soil conditioner that could be applied to land being used to produce hay or silage. Vermicomposting also uses green waste, food waste and cardboard. A solar drying facility near Luggate is expected to be operational in 18 to process Wanaka's sludge into a biosolids for land application.

3.3.3 Forecast of future demand

The Queenstown Lakes District is one of the fasted growing parts of the country. Total waste in the District is expected to increase due to high population, visitor and economic growth. Queenstown Lakes District also has a significant rural area. As the population increases so does the demand for waste and diversion services. Capacity improvements for the waste facilities will be required to accommodate the expected increase of both waste and diverted materials, or alternative facilities will need to be identified.

Population growth increases demand for waste services. Visitor and economic growth will increase demand for commercial collections and increased demand on Council and private facilities, including transfer stations and the

Victoria Flats landfill.






Figure 5 Projected Population and Waste to landfill comparison

3.4 Cost of the current level of service

Council provides its waste services and facilities at an annual cost of \$7,802,727 (FY2015/16). Funding is predominantly provided through general and targeted rates and user charges. Solid waste accounts for 7% of Council's total operating costs and 4.4% of Council's rates funding.

Due to growth it is anticipated that the current level of service will cost \$9,407,982 (FY2017/18).

4 Policies, plans and regulation

There is a clear legislative and policy framework within which the Council provides waste services and facilities within its District. A summary of the framework and legislation is outlined below (Figure 6), however a full list of the legislation, plans and regulations that create the waste framework within which this WMMP is based, is included in Appendix B.

Key legislation affecting waste is:

- Waste Minimisation Act 2008
- Local Government Act 2002
- Resource Management Act 1991
- Climate Change Response Act 2002 (Emissions Trading)
- Litter Act 1979
- Health Act 1956.


While the Waste Minimisation Act sets out the legislative requirements regarding waste, the New Zealand Waste Strategy 2010 (NZWS) provides the government's strategic direction for waste management and minimisation in New Zealand. The goals of this WMMP replicate those from the NZWS.

Local, regional and national plans and policies affect the Council's provision of waste and diverted material services. Primarily, they are requirements under the WMA and the Local Government Act 2002.

4.1 Other relevant documents

The Council and the Otago Regional Council have a number of other strategic documents that are integral to waste management, including:

- Proposed Regional Policy Statement for Otago (currently under appeal, including provisions relating to waste)
- Otago Regional Policy Statement 1998 (Operative)
- Queenstown Lakes District Council Long Term Plan 2015-2025 (note the 2018-2028 Plan will be informed by this WMMP).



5 Proposed methods for achieving effective and efficient waste management and minimisation

5.1 Council's role

In undertaking this WMMP Council has considered what options are available for it to achieve effective and efficient waste management and minimisation to meet future demands for services and facilities.

The role of the Council includes:

Service provision	Providing or facilitating the provision of waste management or waste minimisation service	
Governance	Council further investigating demand and the cost effectiveness of services and options to meet demand, either alone or in collaboration with other councils or private sector parties

In providing waste management and minimisation services, the Council will aim to make existing services more cost-effective and ensure that any increases to levels of services are both cost-effective and affordable. The Council will, as far as practicably possible, make services accessible to the majority of the District.

5.2 Waste management and minimisation – preferred programme

Council has reviewed progress against the previous WMMP action plan and has identified waste issues that need to be addressed. The waste data from the SWAP shows that there are significant opportunities to reduce the amount of organic, glass and construction and demolition material going to landfill. Rather than have an ad-hoc approach to dealing with waste issues, Council has decided to have a realistic, targeted programme that can more effectively deliver our goals and objectives.

In looking at the options to address waste issues and to select which targeted areas Council should focus on, a Waste Management and Minimisation Programme Business Case (PBC) approach was used to identify a preferred programme of work.

A Stakeholder Working Group (SWG) identified and assessed seven different programmes of work. The SWG contained representatives from elected members, contractors, waste minimisation service providers, Council officers and Central Otago District Council (due to the shared landfill).

Each of the seven programmes identified strategic areas and intervention options to address waste issues. Through the business case seven programmes of work were considered from 'Do Minimum' (Programme 1) through to "Aspirational" (Programme 7). Each was assessed for alignment with the vision, goals and objectives, affordability and ease of implementation.

A summary of the status quo compared with the preferred programme is shown in Table 3 below. The full assessment of all programmes is contained in the Waste Assessment in Appendix A.

In choosing Programme 6 the key deciding factors were:

- the programme estimates around 19% decrease of waste to landfill over 10 years
- Council has more influence to make change with residential waste (organics)
- the construction sector may slow down whereas organics will continue to grow
- the programme complements Council's biosolids strategy
- construction and demolition minimisation opportunities can still be explored by the private sector which Council would support where possible
- glass recycling has community support
- the programme continues with existing education and regulation
- existing waste minimisation initiatives will continue
- this programme aligns with other NZ and overseas Councils waste strategies e.g. Auckland, Christchurch and Vancouver who are leading the way in organics recycling

The options assessed in the PBC also address other identified waste issues in the District. Table 4 below provides a summary of district wide issues and how Council's preferred option will deal with each issue. The full-preferred programme is shown in Table 5.

2 Funding

2.1 Funding the plan

The action plan will be funded using the suite of tools available to Council in the delivery of solid waste services. The activities will be funded by:

- General rate
- Targeted rate
- Fees and charges (including gate fees, licensing fees, user charges)
- Subsides and grants
- Private investment
- Debt (if required).

2.2 Waste minimisation levy funding expenditure

Council will continue to use the Waste Minimisation Levy funding income to fund waste education, investigations, trials, and to fund capital expenditure for diversion facilities.

2.3 Grants

Section 47 of the Waste Minimisation Act gives councils the ability to make grants to a person, organisation or group to promote or achieve waste management and minimisation. Under this WMMP the Council will continue to give grants at its discretion and on any terms or condition it deems appropriate provided there is an allocated and approved budget for that activity.

3 Monitoring, evaluating and reporting progress

3.1 Monitoring and evaluation

The Council intends to monitor and report on progress regarding the WMMP and will develop and implement a clear, transparent monitoring and reporting system. Accurate information on how services provided by council are performing is essential for monitoring the effectiveness of the Plan's vision, objectives, goals and targets, and planning for future demand.

Council's current levels of service and performance measures are in the 2015-2025 Long Term Plan and are focussed on reducing the kilograms of residential waste to landfill per head of population.

Council has reviewed its key performance indicators as part of the 2018-2028 Long Term Plan. It is timely to rethink the performance measure because as a tourist destination with visitor numbers in excess of the resident population, a kg per capita measure is only capturing part of the waste story in the District. Measures that provide a broader picture of the waste situation and how to minimise the amount of waste going to landfill will assist Council in identifying more targeted actions in the future. Data will be gathered through:

- Annual resident and ratepayer surveys
- Council Request for Service (RFS) reporting and performance measures
- Contractor reporting against key performance indicators
- Solid Waste Analysis Protocol Audits (SWAPs)
- Waste Assessments
- Consent compliance systems

3.2 Reporting

The Council will report progress of the implementation and effectiveness of this WMMP through:

- Annual Reports
- Monthly performance reports
- Council's website

The Council will also provide progress reports of expenditure of its waste levy funds to the Ministry for the Environment.

4 Glossary

4.1 Key Definitions and abbreviations

Biosolids	sewage sludge derived from a sewage treatment plant that has been treated and/or stabilised to the extent that it is able to be safely and beneficially applied to land and does not include products derived from industrial wastewater treatment plants.
Cleanfill/cleanfill material	inert materials disposed of, into or onto land, at a consented cleanfill. Materials typically include construction and demolition waste such as concrete, uncontaminated soil and rock.
Commercial waste	waste from premises used wholly or mainly for the purposes of trade or business, recreation or entertainment, excluding, mines, quarries and agricultural waste. May also include some household waste collected by commercial operators.
Diverted material	anything no longer required for its original purpose and, but for commercial or other waste minimisation activities, would be disposed of or discarded, and includes any materials that are recyclables, compostable, or can be recovered and/or re-used, as determined by the Council by resolution.
Hazardous waste	waste that is potentially harmful to human and/or environmental health. It typically has one or more of the following hazard properties: explosive, flammable, oxidising, corrosive, radioactive, toxic or ecotoxic, or it may react with air or water to have one of these properties.
Household waste	solid waste generated by households. Household waste does not include divertible waste, hazardous waste, commercial waste, prohibited waste, trade waste or liquid waste of any nature.
Organic waste	compostable materials that are organic in origin and appropriate to be used as feedstock for composting, and includes greenwaste and food waste.
Recycling	the reprocessing of waste or diverted material to produce new materials.
Resource Recovery Park (RRP)	a facility where solid waste materials such as residual waste, construction and demolition waste, recyclables, organic wastes and household hazardous wastes are delivered for sorting or before being taken away for treatment, processing, recycling or disposal, and which may also include a retail outlet for the re- sale of used goods and materials deposited at the site.

Reuse shops	items that are salvaged or diverted from the waste stream undergo little or no modification and are sold at shops run by the community or territorial authorities.
Sewage treatment residuals	solid wastes generated through the process of wastewater treatment.
Solid Waste Analysis Protocol (SWAP):	a study to determine the composition of waste as described by Ministry for the Environment.
Transfer Station (TS)	a facility where solid waste materials such as residual waste, construction and demolition waste, recyclables, organics waste and household hazardous wastes are delivered for consolidation before being taken away for treatment, processing, recycling or disposal.
Waste	 anything disposed of, or discarded, and: includes a type of waste that is defined by its composition or source (for example, organic waste, electronic waste, or construction and demolition waste), and to avoid doubt, includes any component or element of diverted material, if the component or element is disposed of or discarded.
Waste disposal levy	a levy imposed under the Waste Minimisation Act 2008 on waste.
Waste minimisation	the reduction of waste and the reuse, recycling and recovery of waste and diverted material.

Appendix B - Legislative context

The New Zealand Waste Strategy 2010

The New Zealand Waste Strategy 2010 provides the Government's strategic direction for waste management and minimisation in New Zealand. This strategy was released in 2010 and replaced the 2002 Waste Strategy. The New Zealand Waste Strategy has two goals. These are to:

- reduce the harmful effects of waste
- improve the efficiency of resource use.

The strategy's goals provide direction to central and local government, businesses (including the waste industry), and communities on where to focus their efforts to manage waste. The strategy's flexible approach ensures waste management and minimisation activities are appropriate for local situations.

Under section 44 of the Waste Management Act 2008, in preparing their waste management and minimisation plan (WMMP) councils must have regard to the New Zealand Waste Strategy, or any government policy on waste management and minimisation that replaces the strategy.

Waste Minimisation Act 2008

The purpose of the Waste Minimisation Act 2008 (WMA) is to encourage waste minimisation and a decrease in waste disposal to protect the environment from harm and obtain environmental, economic, social and cultural benefits.

The WMA introduced tools, including:

- waste management and minimisation plan obligations for territorial authorities
- a waste disposal levy to fund waste minimisation initiatives at local and central government levels
- product stewardship provisions.

Part 4 of the WMA is dedicated to the responsibilities of a council. Councils "must promote effective and efficient waste management and minimisation within its district" (section 42). Part 4 requires councils to develop and adopt a WMMP. The development of a WMMP in the WMA is a requirement modified from Part 31 of the Local Government Act 1974, but with even greater emphasis on waste minimisation. To support the implementation of a WMMP, section 56 of the WMA also provides councils the ability to:

- develop bylaws
- regulate the deposit, collection and transportation of wastes
- prescribe charges for waste facilities
- control access to waste facilities
- prohibit the removal of waste intended for recycling.

Waste Disposal Levy

From 1 July 2009, the Waste Minimisation Act introduced a waste disposal levy on all waste disposed of at disposal facilities, currently \$10 per tonne, to:

- raise revenue for promoting and achieving waste minimisation
- increase the cost of waste disposal, to recognise that disposal imposes costs on the environment, society, and the economy.

Half of the levy money is given to territorial authorities on a population basis, and the remainder of the levy is available via a contestable fund. The portion returned to Council can only be spent to promote or achieve waste minimisation and in accordance with a council's WMMP.

Local Government Act 2002

The Local Government Act 2002 (LGA) provides the general framework and powers under which New Zealand's democratically elected and accountable local authorities operate. The LGA contains various provisions that may apply to councils when preparing their WMMPs, including consultation and bylaw provisions. For example, Part 6 of the LGA refers to planning and decision-making requirements to promote accountability between local authorities and their communities, and a long-term focus for the decisions and activities of the local authority. This part includes requirements for information to be included in the long-term plan (LTP), including summary information about the WMMP.

Resource Management Act 1991

The Resource Management Act 1991 (RMA) promotes sustainable management of natural and physical resources. Although it does not specifically define 'waste', the RMA addresses waste management and minimisation activity through controls on the environmental effects of waste management and minimisation activities and facilities through national, regional and local policy, standards, plans and consent procedures. In this role, the RMA exercises considerable influence over facilities for waste disposal and recycling, recovery, treatment and others in terms of the potential impacts of these facilities on the environment. Under section 30 of the RMA, regional councils are responsible for controlling the discharge of contaminants into or on to land, air or water. These responsibilities are addressed through regional planning and discharge consent requirements. Other regional council responsibilities that may be relevant to waste and recoverable materials facilities include:

- managing the adverse effects of storing, using, disposing of and transporting hazardous
- wastes
- the dumping of wastes from ships, aircraft and offshore installations into the coastal marine area
- the allocation and use of water.

Under section 31 of the RMA, council responsibility includes controlling the effects of land-use activities that have the potential to create adverse effects on the natural and physical resources of their district. Facilities involved in the disposal, treatment or use of waste or recoverable materials may carry this potential. Permitted, controlled, discretionary, noncomplying and prohibited activities, and their controls, are specified in district planning documents, thereby defining further land-use-related resource consent requirements for waste-related facilities.

In addition, the RMA provides for the development of national policy statements and for the setting of national environmental standards (NES). There is currently one enacted NES that directly influences the management of waste in New Zealand – the Resource Management (National Environmental Standards for Air Quality) Regulations 2004. This NES requires certain landfills (e.g., those with a capacity of more than 1

million tonnes of waste) to collect landfill gases and either flare them or use them as fuel for generating electricity. Unless exemption criteria are met, the NES for Air Quality also prohibits the lighting of fires and burning of wastes at landfills, the burning of tyres, bitumen burning for road maintenance, burning coated wire or oil, and operating high-temperature hazardous waste incinerators. These prohibitions aim to protect air quality.

New Zealand Emissions Trading Scheme

The Climate Change Response Act 2002 and associated regulations is the Government's principal response to manage climate change. A key mechanism for this is the New Zealand Emissions Trading Scheme (NZ ETS) The NZ ETS puts a price on greenhouse gas emissions, providing an incentive for people to reduce emissions and plant forests to absorb carbon dioxide.

Certain sectors are required to acquire and surrender emission units to account for their direct greenhouse gas emissions or the emissions associated with their products. Landfills that are subject to the waste disposal levy are required to surrender emission units to cover methane emissions generated from landfill. These disposal facilities are required to report the tonnages landfilled annually to calculate emissions.

Climate Change Response Act 2002 (Emissions Trading) and the Climate Change Amendment Act 2008

The Climate Change Response Act 2002, Climate Change (Waste) Regulations 2010 and Amendments to the Climate Change (Unique Emissions Factors) Regulations are implemented through the New Zealand Emissions Trading Scheme (ETS). The purpose of the ETS is to reduce the amount of greenhouse gases emitted in New Zealand. The waste sector is affected by the ETS, as those who operate landfills are required to participate in the scheme and report emissions.

As the Council operates a landfill within the District, there are implications for the Council.

The Climate Change Amendment Act 2008 provides for disposal facility regulations and the ETS.

Litter Act 1979

Under the Litter Act 1979 it is an offence for any person to deposit litter of any kind in a public place, or onto private land without the approval of the owner. The Litter Act is enforced by territorial authorities, who have the responsibility to monitor litter dumping, act on complaints, and deal with those responsible for litter dumping. Councils reserve the right to prosecute offenders via fines and infringement notices administered by a litter control warden or officer. The maximum fines for littering are \$5,000 for a person and \$20,000 for a corporation. Council powers under the Litter Act could be used to address illegal dumping issues that may be included in the scope of a council's waste management and minimisation plan.

Health Act 1956

The Health Act 1956 places obligations on councils (if required by the Minister of Health) to provide sanitary works for the collection and disposal of refuse, for the purpose of public health protection (Part 2 – Powers and duties of local authorities, section 25). The Act specifically identifies certain waste management practices as nuisances (section 29) and offensive trades (Third Schedule). The Health Act enables councils to raise loans for certain sanitary works and/or to receive government grants and subsidies, where available. Health Act provisions to remove refuse by local authorities have been repealed.

Other legislation

Other legislation that relates to waste management and/or reduction of harm, or improved resource efficiency from waste products includes:

- Hazardous Substances and New Organisms Act 1996
- Biosecurity Act 1993
- Radiation Protection Act 1965
- Ozone Layer Protection Act 1996
- Agricultural Chemicals and Veterinary Medicines Act 1997.

Other waste related legislation

Other legislation relevant to waste management and minimisation includes:

- Health and Safety at Work Act 2015 (HSWA) is New Zealand's workplace health and safety law.
 HSWA sets out the principles, duties and rights in relation to workplace health and safety.
- Hazardous Substances and New Organisms Act 1996 that provides regulations and standards related to hazardous substances.
- Local Government (Rating) Act 2002
- Freedom Camping Act 2011 which controls freedom camping on all land controlled or managed by a particular local authority.

Regional policy statements, regional plans and strategies

Otago Regional Council has a Regional Policy Statement and Regional Plans which contains rules relating to discharges to air, land and water, which are relevant for facilities (e.g. resource recovery parks, transfer stations, landfills) and waste processing (e.g. composting, biosolids processing).

International commitments

New Zealand is party to the following key international agreements:

- Montreal Protocol to protect the ozone layer by phasing out the production of numerous substances
- Basel Convention to reduce the movement of hazardous waste between nations
- Stockholm Convention to eliminate or restrict the production and use of persistent organic pollutants
- Waigani Convention bans export of hazardous or radioactive waste to Pacific Islands Forum countries
- United Nations Agenda 2030 a universal agenda to achieve sustainable development globally

1 Introduction

Queenstown Lakes District Council (Council) has a statutory responsibility to promote effective and efficient waste management and minimisation within the Queenstown Lakes District (Section 42, Waste Minimisation Act 2008 (WMA)). As part of this responsibility, the Council is required to complete a Waste Assessment (WA) which in turn informs the development of the Council's Waste Management and Minimisation Plan (WMMP).

This WA report has been prepared in accordance with Section 51 of the WMA. It provides details of the following:

- existing waste services provided in the District (Council and non-council)
- waste quantities, composition and flows
- identification of issues
- future demand for services
- vision, goals, objectives and targets for waste management and minimisation
- guiding principles to direct how to get to where the Council wants to be
- an options assessment/statement of proposals for waste services and identified district issues through the Waste Management and Minimisation Programme Business Case (PBC)

The Council is planning to review and adopt its WMMP by Dec 2017 in order to meet the six yearly review requirement of the WMA and to fit in with the timeframe for the Long Term Plan 2018-2028. Council adopted the current WMMP in December 2011.

2 Common themes

In undertaking this WA, a number of common themes and interlinked issues have emerged which are outlined below.

2.1 Strategic importance

The WA and WMMP need to be undertaken within the context of the New Zealand Waste Strategy 2010 (NZWS), Council's strategic framework, vision and goals and the legislative requirements of the WMA.

The NZ Waste Strategy sets out the government's long term priorities for waste management and minimisation, and has two goals:

- Goal 1: Reducing the harmful effects of waste
- Goal 2: Improving the efficiency of resource use

Each option and opportunity needs to be brought back and analysed with this at the forefront, to ensure alignment with these strategic goals and objectives.



2.2 High number of visitors

The Queenstown Lakes area is a magnet for tourists, which brings particular challenges in the area of waste management. The number of tourists visiting the area far out numbers local residents, however residents are paying for a level or frequency of service for parts of the district that has to meet the need of a highly mobile, and in many cases outdoor-focused tourist, rather than a resident population. The 2015/16 Annual Plan indicates that at peak times 100,000+ people are using the district's infrastructure which has a resident population of 30,700¹ and 22,400 rateable properties that are paying for that infrastructure. Because of the high number of tourists, statistics on waste are skewed (e.g. the volume of waste generated per usual resident population is inaccurate as the data includes all waste generated by the visitor industry), and it means that solutions to district specific issues need to focus on the needs of both the resident and non-resident. This visitor impact is more pronounced in Queenstown Lakes District than in other districts of New Zealand.

2.3 Education across industries, tourists and residents

In order to meet the vision of the WMMP – "Towards Zero Waste and a Sustainable District" there needs to be a targeted education programme to reach those groups that are impacting on the ability to achieve the vision of the WMMP. Work needs to be undertaken with the tourism industry, whether that is rental companies, tramping / transport / tour operators, to continually educate and provide a consistent message on how to reduce, re-use and recycle in the District. Clear signage and directions would be instrumental for changing visitor behaviours to encourage them to do the right thing when it comes to waste.

Similarly, industry, particularly the construction and demolition industry, need to have clear messaging and access to sound advice on reducing waste to landfill as the increase in development has seen an increase in construction and demolition waste to landfill.

Council needs to make it easy for industry, residents and tourists to do the right thing. To work towards this Council can provide the right services and facilities in the right location, provide clear messaging, signage and directions to make it easy to dispose of material in the right way. There is a need to encourage the people of the district, and those passing through, to make better and easier choices when it comes to waste management and minimisation. Council services need to be supported and promoted by effective education in order to change behaviours and to achieve better waste outcomes for the District.

2.4 Section 17A – Delivery of services

Section 17A of the Local Government Act 2002 (LGA) sets out the requirement for local authorities to "review the cost-effectiveness of current arrangements for meeting the needs of communities within its district or region for good-quality local infrastructure, local public services, and performance of regulatory functions."




Figure 1 Interlinked Section 17A components of cost-effectiveness and community needs

The two prongs of a Section 17A assessment as shown in Figure 1 below, puts the customer at the forefront of the assessment in tandem with cost-effectiveness. For the customer, this may mean that cost-effectiveness does not mean least cost, and therefore understanding what your community needs is critical to delivering a service in alignment with community expectations.

Section 17A reviews provide Council with the opportunity to undertake a full review of the way in which a service is delivered. As part of this process, discussions with surrounding territorial authorities are critical as there may be options for regional collaboration that benefits more communities, and results in greater efficiencies and opportunities to achieve waste minimisation goals. A solid waste Section 17A review is to be undertaken on a regional basis in 2017.

2.5 National advocacy

Many waste minimisation initiatives are more suitably implemented at a national level, such as:

- Product stewardship schemes for problematic waste streams (e.g. e-waste, tyres);
- National Environmental Standards (e.g. for the outdoor storage of tyres);
- Changes to the Waste Disposal Levy; or
- Container Deposit legislation.

There is a need to work with national bodies such as WasteMINZ and the Ministry for the Environment to encourage ongoing support for and the implementation of waste minimisation activities through a coordinated advocacy approach to government and industry.

Alongside other organisations, Council will continue to support development and implementation of national waste minimisation initiatives. Depending on the final make up of any national scheme, Council support could be through the provision of infrastructure, services or regulatory processes, or education and support for businesses and residents to meet their obligations under any new scheme.



3 Part 1 – The waste situation

Council provides a range of waste management services across the district to businesses and households and to some of the rural townships (refer Appendix 2).

The following section contains information regarding:

- council provided services and facilities
- non-council provided services and facilities
- waste flows
- waste quantities and composition
- identified waste issues
- forecast future demand.

3.1 Council services and facilities

Council provides a range of waste collection, recycling, recovery, processing and disposal services and facilities in the district that are funded through targeted rates, the waste levy, user charges and general rates.

Council waste services and facilities include:

- Kerbside refuse collection using council approved bags and wheelie bins
 - weekly service provided to Queenstown, Glenorchy, Arrowtown, Lake Hayes, Kingston, Wanaka,
 Gibbston, Albert-Town, Hawea, Makarora and Luggate
 - twice daily collection of refuse in the Queenstown CBD
 - daily collection refuse from the Wanaka CBD
- Rural refuse collection points
 - weekly collection of refuse in rural areas from four collection points at Gibbston, Hawea, Dublin Bay and Maungawera
- Kerbside recycling collection
 - Wakatipu weekly recycling collection service provided to eligible residential properties in Queenstown, Glenorchy, Arrowtown, Lake Hayes and Kingston
 - Wanaka weekly kerbside recycling collection service to eligible residential properties in Wanaka, Albert Town, Makarora, Hawea and Luggate
- Rural recycling drop off facilities
 - Wakatipu weekly recycling collection service in rural areas from one collection point at Gibbston Valley
 - Wanaka twice weekly collection service in rural areas from three collection points (Off peak in Hawea is twice a week, Dublin and Maungawera are once per week. In peak times Hawea is 7 days a week, and at least twice per week for Dublin and Maungawera).
- Transfer stations Frankton (Queenstown) and Wanaka acceptance of waste and acceptance, sorting and storage of recyclable materials, public drop off facilities for recycling and green waste, tyres, scrap metal, hazardous goods



- Wakatipu Transfer Station owned by council and operated under contract by AllWaste drop off facilities for recyclable materials (green waste, tyres, scrap metal, hazardous goods drop off) and disposal of general waste
- Wanaka Transfer Station site owned by Queenstown Lakes District Council and operated under contract by All Waste - drop off facilities for recyclable materials (green waste, tyres, scrap metal, hazardous goods drop off) and disposal of general waste
- Wakatipu Recycling Centre Material Recovery Facility operated by Smart Environmental Ltd under Build Own Operate and Transfer contract. Owned and operated by Smart Environmental on a site owned by Council
 - Accepts kerbside-collected recyclables from council collections from both the Queenstown Lakes and Central Otago DistrictsAccepts recyclable material from private recycling services for both the residential and commercial sectors
 - Co-mingled recyclables are sorted using a combination of mechanical equipment and manual sorting
 - Consolidates separated recyclables and arranges transport to processing facilities in New Zealand and overseas
 - Operates a re-sale shop
- Victoria Flats landfill owned by Queenstown Lakes District Council, operated by SCOPE under Build Own Operate and Transfer contract. Accepts waste from the Queenstown Lakes and Central Otago Districts.
- Rural greenwaste drop off points in Glenorchy, Kingston, Luggate, Hawea and Makorara
- Hazardous waste drop off services for residential quantities of hazardous waste at the Frankton transfer station and Wanaka Transfer Station
- Biosolids disposal / processing
 - Council is progressing a vermicomposting trial at the Victoria Flats landfill
- Provision and servicing of litter bins and public place recycling bins
- Waste minimisation education/initiatives and programmes including:
 - EERST (Environmental Education for Resource Sustainability, Enviroschools programme and Dr Compost (environmental education contracted to Wanaka Wastebusters)
 - Love Food Hate Waste campaign
 - Waste Free Parenting,
- Monitoring and maintenance of nine closed landfills at Tucker Beach, Wanaka, Glenorchy, Hawea, Kingston, Makarora, Luggate, Albert Town and Warren Park.
- Annual inorganic collection in Glenorchy, Biannual in Makarora, Twice yearly in Kingston
- Subsidised home composting initiative "Bokashi" Bins



3.2 Non-council provided services and facilities

Private companies continue to provide user charges services to meet additional requirements of the community. The following services are known to be provided:

- Private collection services for refuse and recycling for residential and commercial customers, including skip bin services for construction and demolition waste
- Collection of divertible material recyclables and greenwaste, including soft plastics and bottle banks
 - by private companies
 - by community groups/enterprise
- Cleanfill sites
- Wanaka Wastebusters recycling resale shop

3.3 Waste flows




Figure 2 Map of the Queenstown Lakes District with the Wakatipu and Wanaka Areas

The map of the Queenstown Lakes District Council area as shown in Figure 2 below indicates the scale of the area for which Council provides waste services. The area is divided into two wards, Wakatipu and Wanaka.

Figure 3 below shows the various waste flows and volumes into the Victoria Flats Landfill from the two transfer stations in the District, two transfer stations in Central Otago District, and also kerbside collection, general waste, special waste and glass from the Wakatipu recycling centre.

3.4 Waste quantities and composition

It is important for Council to understand the quantity and composition of waste coming through its services so that it can identify opportunities to reduce waste to landfill. This could be by making appropriate policy, service and community education responses that ultimately achieve the vision, goals, objectives and targets of delivering the WMMP.

3.4.1 Waste




Figure 4 Waste quantities (tonnes) sent to Victoria Flats landfill from Queenstown Lakes District from 2003-2016

Figure 4 shows the amount of waste generated by the Queenstown Lakes District that is disposed at the Victoria Flats landfill. From 2003 to 2008 there was an increase in the amount of waste going to the landfill, however, this dropped back to just under 2003 levels in 2012 as a result of a slowdown in economic activity following the Global Financial Crisis. Since 2012 there has been a steady increase in the amount of waste from the District going to the



landfill, and in 2016 it is at its highest recorded. This in part due to increased tourism, the construction boom and the recent landfilling of glass, due to the existing recycle end-use market being no longer available.

Since 2004 the Council has been recording the quantities of waste and diverted material that they have handled. In July/August 2016, the Council commissioned an analysis of the composition of waste being disposed of to landfill from the District. The studies comprised six days of surveying at Wanaka and Wakatipu transfer stations and the analysis of weighbridge records for the transfer stations and Victoria Flats landfill. The methodology for the analysis was designed to be consistent with the Ministry for the Environment's Solid Waste Analysis Protocol (SWAP). The figures below are taken from the SWAP report which is attached in Appendix 1.

Council has a target in its current Long Term Plan (2015) to reduce the amount of residential waste to landfill per head of population from a baseline of 188kg (June 2014) to less than 160kg for the 2016/17 financial year, and reducing again to 155kg in the 2017/18 financial year. However, there was an increase in residential waste to landfill in 2015/16 to 258kg. This can be explained by the recent landfilling of glass and as a result of the 100,000+ visitors to the district in 2015/16. In no way can this be attributed solely to the resident population. Therefore it is proposed that more representative targets to track performance are used in the new WMMP.

There has been a significant increase in the amount of glass going to the Victoria Flats landfill, rising 7% in the last 4 years because the glass collected in the Wakatipu Ward was landfilled. This is due to the fact that the glass product generated from the MRF processing the commingled recycling at the Wakatipu Recycling Centre (MRF) has a low financial value because it is not colour-sorted and contains a high degree of contamination reducing the recyclables value.

Similarly there has been an increase in the amount of rubble being received at the Victoria Flats landfill. This reflects the high level of construction and demolition waste being produced as a result of the current construction boom in the Queenstown Lakes District (timber also remains a high proportion of the waste received at these facilities).



The amount of organic material in the waste stream has reduced between 4-14% across the facilities between 2012 and 2016. However, Table 1 below demonstrates that organic material represents the highest material tonnage per week at 152t at the Victoria Flats landfill, 17t greater than timber, the second highest material going to landfill.




Figure 5 Primary composition of Victoria Flats landfill waste from Queenstown Lakes District (from 2016 Survey) (Total 649 T/week including waste carted directly to landfill from the Queenstown Lakes District)

Figure 5 gives the waste composition breakdown of the types of waste entering the Victoria Flats landfill from the Queenstown Lakes District. Timber was the largest component with 18.9% of the total by weight. Organic material was the next highest component at 16%, and rubble close behind at 15.3% of total weight.

3.4.2 Diverted material

Diverted materials are predominantly those from kerbside recycling collection services, from drop off facilities for recycling and green waste and re-use shops. The Annual Report 2015/2016 indicates that diverted materials from landfill increased from 226kg to 260kg per head of population from 2014/15 to 2015/16.

The waste diversion percentage is shown in Figure 6. The figures prior to 2011/12 are taken from the 2012 Asset Management Plan (AMP). The underlying waste tonnage figures in the 2012 AMP were taken from different sources, however the historical figures still provide some comparison with the last five years.





Figure 6 Queenstown Lakes District waste generated and waste diversion rate

Figure 6 shows that the amount of waste diverted has increased in recent years, however the total amount of waste generated has increased at a greater rate. This has resulted in a decrease in the diversion rate over the last five years.

Table 2 shows the percentage of divertable material in the overall waste streams across the two transfer stations and the Victoria Flats landfill. There is potentially 53% divertable material across the waste streams.

3.4.3 Sewage Treatment Residuals

The sludge from Council's waste water treatment plants until recently was taken to the Victoria Flats landfill. Sludge was viewed as potentially causing odour when delivered to landfill and an agreement was reached to take sludge somewhere else as an interim measure. Sludge is currently disposed of at the AB Lime's landfill in Southland. Council is exploring other options to dispose of sludge and is currently trialling a vermicomposting solution as an alternative means of dealing with the sludge. The end product from the vermicomposting would be a soil conditioner that could be applied to land being used to produce hay or silage. Vermicomposting also uses greenwaste and cardboard and could be expanded to process other organic wastes e.g. organic waste. A solar drying facility near Luggate is expected to be operational by Dec 2017 to process Wanaka's sludge into a biosolids for land application.

3.5 Forecast of future demand

The Queenstown Lakes District is one of the fasted growing parts of the country. Total waste in the District is expected to increase due to high population, visitor and economic growth. Queenstown Lakes District also has a significant rural area. As the population increases demand for waste and diversion services also increase. Capacity improvements for the waste facilities will be required to accommodate the expected increase of both waste and diverted materials, or alternative facilities will need to be identified.

3.5.1 Growth projections

Population growth increases demand for waste services. Visitor and economic growth will increase demand for commercial collections and place increased demand on Council and private facilities, including transfer stations and the Victoria Flats Landfill.

Note: Growth forecasts used from 2016-17 were adopted for the WA. More recent forecasts predict even higher growth, and the programmes identified allow for this increased growth.






Figure 7 Projected Population and Waste to landfill comparison

3.5.2 Meeting customer needs

Council undertakes an annual ratepayers and residents survey, the most recent survey being in 2016. The main themes from the survey relating to waste were:

- get rid of blue plastic bags
- provide more rubbish bins in public spaces and green spaces (in particular for dog owners and freedom campers)
- empty rubbish bins more frequently
- clean up litter in the outskirts of the main centres
- provide recycling and green waste services to reduce rubbish into landfill
- concerns about roadside litter beyond the town centres
- builders' rubbish blowing around near work sites and torn blue rubbish bags making the streets messy.

From these themes there are a number of opportunities that arise for Council to better educate the community on the facilities and services already available.

3.6 Identified waste issues

Having reviewed progress against the previous WMMP Action Plan and considering the change in waste quantities since the last WMMP, Council has identified the following issues that need to be addressed in the next WMMP:

- glass going to landfill rather than being recycled
- the high volume of organic waste going to landfill
- the high volume and increasing proportion of construction and demolition waste going to landfill
- biosolids disposal



- the impact of tourists/visitors generating, and high volumes, of unseparated waste that is resulting in recyclables going to landfill
- the high proportion of paper and plastics going to landfill
- how to manage permitted activity cleanfill sites
- the lack of capacity of the Wakatipu Transfer Station and Wakatipu Recycling Centre to meet future demand
- the location of public place litter and recycling bins and frequency of clearing
- challenges in the accessibility to collect waste from the CBD and multi-unit developments (MUDs)
- increased landfill disposal costs due to the phasing out of the one-for two transitional measure of the Emissions Trading Scheme which commenced in 1 January 2017.

These issues are addressed within Table 4, the Waste Management and Minimisation Project Business Case included in Part 3 of this WA.



4 Part 2 – Where do we want to be?

4.1 Vision, goals, guiding principles, objectives and targets

Working together, Council and the community can achieve more effective and efficient waste management and minimisation in the District. Council is proposing the following vision, goals, objectives and targets. Taken together these form the strategy for Council's WMMP.

4.1.1 Vision

Our vision for the future is:

"Towards zero waste and a sustainable district"

4.1.2 Goals

The goals that we will use are those from the New Zealand Waste Strategy:

- Improving the efficiency of resource use
- · Reducing harmful effects of waste

4.1.3 Our objectives

Our objectives to meet our goals are:

5 Part 3 - How are we going to get there?

5.1 Our guiding principles

In developing options, Council will be guided by the following principles:

- Global citizenship
- Kaitiakitanga / stewardship
- Product stewardship
- Full cost pricing
- Life cycle pricing
- Precautionary principle.

5.2 Options for meeting future demand (Statement of Proposals)

In looking at options for meeting future demand the Council will reconsider its current waste minimisation actions (i.e. the status quo) to focus on key issues rather than continuing with the many actions in the current WMMP. In saying that, the Council will continue to provide and support educational programmes such as Enviroschools, the Nappy Lady, and the environment education for resource sustainability programme. Council will also continue to support existing waste minimisation and resource efficiency initiatives, advocate to government for change, maintain the existing recycling and transfer station facilities and Victoria Flats landfill and collaborate with other councils to promote waste management and minimisation.

With additional waste diversion the Victoria Flats landfill is also expected to be able to meet the districts residual waste needs until the end of its consent in 2029.

5.2.1 Focusing in on key issues

Council, working with a Stakeholder Working Group, has made a decision that rather than creating a WA and WMMP which has too many actions for it to reasonably achieve over the life of the WMMP (a criticism of the last WMMP 2011), to instead focus effort where Council has the greatest ability to influence, and target the waste streams with the most opportunity to reduce waste to landfill i.e.

- reduced glass and
- either reduced organics or reduced construction and demolition waste

Focusing on specific areas enables a targeted effort to achieve goals and provide clear messaging to residents, ratepayers and visitors on the key waste issues facing the district.

5.2.1.1 Reducing glass to landfill

Council currently provides different levels of service for glass collection in the District. In doing this Council is not able to take advantage of a national market for colour sorted glass and is sending glass to landfill that could be diverted.



5.2.1.2 Reducing organics to landfill

Reducing organics to landfill will have an ongoing significant impact on the Victoria Flats landfill given the current high tonnage of 104T/ week. The benefits of choosing to target reducing organics to landfill is that this will have an ongoing benefit with households and business continuing to generate organic waste even when the construction boom ends.

5.2.1.3 Reducing construction and demolition waste to landfill

Reducing construction and demolition waste will have a significant impact on the Victoria Flats landfill as it currently represents approximately 34% (indicatively rubble 15.3% and timber 18.9%) of the total weight going to landfill. In considering whether to prioritise this option over reducing organics, consideration needs to be given to the projected population growth over time to determine whether the current high volumes are likely to be for a short duration, or if there is likely to be a longer time period where a sustained reduction in construction and demolition waste is possible.

5.2.2 Waste management and minimisation programme business case (PBC)

In looking at the options to address waste issues and to select which targeted areas Council should focus on, a Waste Management and Minimisation PBC approach was used to identify a preferred programme of work. NZ Treasury are advocating the use of this approach to enable smart investment decisions for public value.

Potential intervention options were identified by the Working Group for each of councils waste services activities: waste minimisation education, advocacy and collaboration, regulation, refuse, recycling, glass, organics, biosolids, C & D waste, cleanfill, waste facilities and landfill, landfill, hazardous waste, public place wastes and visitors.

Seven different programmes of work were identified that utilised different intervention options depending on the focus for that programme. The seven options were assessed through the PBC process. The interventions chosen for each programme option are shown in Table 4 below.

After a full assessment of all seven options, Programme 6 was selected as the preferred Option. Programme 6 focuses on organics and glass by providing more waste minimisation services and facilities that target organics and glass, and retains the current approach to education and regulation. In choosing Programme 6 over Programme 7, the key deciding factors were:

- the programme could have around 19% decrease of waste to landfill over 10 years which although is slightly less that the construction and demolition programme in terms of diversion, Council has more influence over residential waste than the construction sector's waste
- the construction sector may slow down whereas organics will continue to grow
- the programme complements Council's biosolids strategy
- construction and demolition facility opportunities can still be explored by the private sector which Council would support where possible
- the programme continues with existing education and regulation
- existing waste minimisation initiatives will continue.

5.2.3 Waste stream projections

Based on the options identified in the PBC in Table 4 and population growth, anticipated waste and diverted material is expected to increase over the next 10 years.



Figure 8 Waste stream projections

Figure 9 shows the 10 year waste projections assuming a 6.9% growth rate and the different waste diversion rates anticipated from the interventions proposed for each programme. The status quo will not result in any improvement in Council achieving its vision, objectives and targets. Only Programmes 4-7 show any real measurable reduction in waste of the seven PBC options, with the preferred Programme, Programme 6, having a 19% reduction in waste when looking towards 2027.

5.3 Medical Officer of Health statement

Public Health South notes that this plan is for the next 6 years and that growth is predicted to continue in QLDC. The vision is "Towards zero waste and a sustainable district" and the Council states it has adequate landfill facilities available for disposal of waste for the next 20+ years, however, this may change should growth rates change. Enhancing waste minimisation practices, such as diversion of recyclables and better re-use of organic material, along with education, is crucial for longer-term sustainability, population wellbeing and protection of public health over the period of the plan.





QLDC Is not doing enough to promote recycling and while we need to bring added focus to glass and organics, more needs to be done with the rest of the waste stream, particularly from commercial business and construction waste and recycling. The target should be zero waste to landfill, with maximum recycling and a waste to energy scheme, turning any non recyclable material into electricity to power the local community.







Submission to the Waste Minimization and Management Plan

It is clear that the Queenstown Lakes District Council's (QLDC) waste management collection system has failed to achieve its ambitious targets set in 2008 and that changes are needed.

We support Council's proposed and existing kerbside re-cycling and organic waste collection but believe it falls short of the community's needs and expectations. General waste collection should be included in the proposed revamp.

The ideal collection system would be a three or four wheelie bin system. This could be a green lid bin (240 litres) for organics, a red lid bin (120 litres) for waste, a yellow lid bin (120 litres) for recyclables and a blue lid bin (120 litres) for glass. Alternately the current black bin (currently in use in Wanaka) could be utilized for glass but the disadvantage of this is it would not be able to be lifted into the truck by mechanical mean as wheelie bins are.

Having a three or four bin system does not necessarily mean it will encourage more waste going to the landfill but will channel some waste (especially organics) currently going to the landfill to alternate use. It may be possible to introduce fortnightly cycles for collection of recyclables refuse and garden waste. In the cooler months (perhaps aligned to daylight saving times) waste collection could be fortnightly/weekly.

Wanaka residents have already demonstrated they are responsive to sorting recycling into glass and other recyclables and there is no reason to suggest that they

could not extend this across the whole range of waste.

At the time the two crate recycling system was introduced the contractor asked that newspapers/paper put directly into the crates, not in a plastic bag. After about three weeks with paper blowing all over the district they asked users to resume using paper in supermarket type bags. With the proposed withdrawal of supermarket bags council can expect paper to be blown out of crates while waiting for collection, if the current system of recycling is retained.

This suggested wheelie bin system for waste and recycling is currently in use by many South Island Local Authorities (Timaru, Clutha, Southland, Central Otago to name a few) and appears to be popular with the ratepayers I have spoken to and don't offer any objection to the cost of providing this service..

The zero waste ideal put forward at the time of the last long term plan is no closer to happening now as when it was proposed around 2008. The plastic bags for other household rubbish are flimsy and inadequate, able to be torn open by cats, dogs and vermin, and present a real potential for danger to collectors. Wheelie bins are a safer and more efficient system for operators to use, and tidier and more hygienic for householders.

Residents have themselves made their preference for wheelie bin waste disposal abundantly obvious because large numbers of them are paying for bins in addition to the council-provided service. QLDC figures provided by Morrison Low show 36% of Wanaka's and 44% of Queenstown's household waste is collected from the kerbside by private (non-Council) collection services

There will be an initial cost but a long-term benefit. If the QLDC is trying to cut down on plastic, the blue rubbish bags are just more plastic into landfill. Wheelie bins would be a better option as there won't litter all over the streets, there won't be foul smells, and there will be nothing to attract pests, or pollute the environment.

Currently household items that are not recyclable include, milk and juice cartons, waxy paper and cardboard, foil lined cartons, soiled paper (e.g. with food), juice/tomato sauce/stock boxes and cartons (co-mingled, made with foil, cardboard and plastic), Cold ashes, Batteries (e.g. torch smoke alarm), some polystyrene packaging, disposable nappies, some clothing and shoes, electrical appliances, broken glass, Pyrex glass products, ceramics etc. This is an example of items (and there are many others) that cannot be recycled and currently go to the land fill and will continue to do so for the foreseeable future.

Summary

- Wheelie bins are a safer and more efficient system for operators to use, and tidier and more hygienic for householders.
- Councils throughout the country are turning to three bin systems as a means of using recycling to reduce costs and dispose of unwanted items, in addition to the benefits of limiting landfill disposal.
- Fewer people have gardens or the interest in maintaining them, QLDC's high number of tourists/skiers and itinerant population generally works against correct waste disposal, especially organic waste to the landfill but they may be inclined to use the correct bin if they were available.
- Introduction of a comprehensive three bin system will encourage residents to place waste in the correct bin and not 'hide' waste amongst recycling (as happened

when Queenstown introduced recycling wheelie bins). It will assist or possibly eliminate the illegal but frequent dumping of refuse along the road verges and reserves around the district.

- After the initial setup costs there is potential saving on collection costs especially if a fortnightly service is introduced.
- The fact that so many residents have responded to the many disadvantages of the existing system by preferring private operators utilizing a wheelie bin service suggests more council realism and less idealism at street level is required.

We trust that council give this submission serious consideration



I think QLDC needs to get bolder with it's overall plan.

Many residents in Hawea already recycle or compost their organic waste. The glass recycling depot in Hawea is currently threatened with closure which is where much of the excess glass is dumped during peak seasons as residents are often reluctant to venture into Wanaka to dispose of recyclables during peak seasons which are often in excess of a normal weekly pick-up.

Anecdotally, it has been suggested that glass collections in Hawea often exceed those of the Wanaka kerbside collections in peak season. Hawea is a destination for not only holiday home owners but also family and friends of residents.

With limited commercial options available to go out in Hawea and a taxi costing \$45 one way from Wanaka, much of the social drinking is done in private residences. As a result, the glass recyclables can be far in excess of a normal rubbish week. I don't think this current focus provides any benefit to the residents of Hawea if the existing recycling depot were to close and does little to address none of the challenges that Hawea Residents face with rubbish.

We need to think bigger.

Hawea is a fast growing area and with only one main road into town that doubles up as the main state highway between Wanaka/Queenstown and the West Coast, its a road that many of the locals are keen to avoid during peak season. (There is the road to Luggate but, you also come onto a main highway so, there is little advantage.)

Hawea has limited commercial businesses to support the local community and these are generally over-subscribed during peak periods. Holiday houses fill up and friends and family come to visit the locals. Much of the socialising during these periods, takes place in private residences and this causes recycling levels to peak, particularly glass.

With the on-going development in Hawea, both of these issues will continue to build. Other issues include the rubbish collection day that often means rubbish will sit on the kerbside until it is collected on Thursday which leaves it susceptible to animals as many people vacate on a Sunday. The recycling depot which is currently under discussion of closure, enables visitors an accessible area to leave rubbish which means the removal of this service is likely to cause more animal related issues and the likelihood that more glass will go to landfill.

I understand the issues around the existing facility and the concerns with dumping that the community is experiencing. Along with others, I believe these concerns would be reduced if it were manned and had greater capacity to deal with waste. I also understand the arguments against this however, I propose that the Council consider developing a 3rd transfer station located in Hawea with enough room to incorporate business interests that rely on waste materials.

This could include an up-cycle craft market such as those found in Sweden where all goods on sale are either up-cycled, repaired or re-purposed.

Other businesses that could be of interest might be plastic orientated such as those that re-purpose it into other functional items or, even road materials as we have seen a company do in Canterbury.

There are no glass manufacturers in the South Island and we have a burgeoning artisan food market developing right across the country. The glass market is cornered by Arthur Holmes and Endeavour who bring in all their glass from China. Maybe someone would be interested in a business that produced glass packaging or simply involved recycled glass? Providing a local option for glass packaging would be a

very popular move for small businesses if it were done on a commercial scale. You could then charge other regions to take their well sorted glass.

Clothing, textiles, tailoring, the list is endless but, if space was made available, I believe the artists and crafts people would come.

A builders reclamation yard would be just the ticket for the area given lots of us have small garden and house projects. (If you're really onto it, you just need to go to a building site and ask if you can go through the skips but, how much do we miss that just goes to landfill?) Increase the charge to dump construction waste and take usable waste for free to on-sell.

A greenwaste and commercial composting option would also provide the opportunity to sell the end product back to the public and could be tied in with the current initiative.

Wanaka WasteBusters is an awe inspiring achievement however, the Wanaka township is creeping up to claim it and the existing site is packed tight with limited opportunity to expand operations or deal with the expected growth of both Wanaka and Hawea (and Luggate, Albertown, Cardrona). I don't propose losing the site however, the development in the greater area makes it an unattractive trip during peak season with busy junctions, foreign drivers, a new retail park and limited ability to park on site. I believe there will always be a place for WasteBusters however, I believe the opportunity exists in Hawea to develop the next generation of waste management.

Be BOLD! Use it as a template for the rest of the region. I believe we can achieve zero waste but, only if we make dynamic changes to the way we live, dump and reuse things!



Composting is the most logical way forward for organic reuse. It accounts for the biological processes that stabilise organic matter and the potential of heavy metals and pathogens. I am including biosolids, food waste, and green waste. Not all together, but as a method of processing organics, composting has safeguards, a standard NZS: 4454 and a biosolid guideline for the accumulative effects of application as well as health related aspects.

I have investigated other options for cost effective management such as vermicomposting, and thermal drying, which both need a secondary action of hot composting to either eliminate pathogen risk, or action the degradation of solid material. Composting however, does it all at once.

Recently we travelled overseas and had the privilege of going to Copenhagen. Just outside of the city they have had a rubbish incineration plant built. The plant essentially burns what would go to landfill and by doing so produces power. This plant has been architecturally designed into a ski slope which they can use in winter and will be self powered. With their rubbish alone the plant is only up to 30% capacity therefore a number of other countries are paying Copenhagen to take and burn their rubbish providing more income. The chimneys are filtered and rubbish burnt hot to provide a cleaner environmental impact. This has been proven to be of less environmental damage than toxin leeching landfills that can never really be used for anything else but wasted space after they are finished with.

In New Zealand we promote a clean green image but I feel we are far behind in environmental impact. To be honest the majority people are too busy working to make a living in this town and often don't have the time to prioritise their personal waste management. I think often we think of management options that make do and minimise the current problem when often there are bigger potential solutions that can work to our advantage. Yes a waste plant would be expensive but certainly not in the long run through power generation and income revenue. Its time we stopped looking 5 years ahead and started planning at least 50 years ahead and create a legacy and life for our children's children. Other councils at least give us a discount in the waste management charge as we aren't included in roadside collection - clutha DC and CODC where we also pay rates, but QLDC makes us pay the same as someone in town who does have the convenience of rubbish and recycling collection. We also aren't that far out, as a house about 3 minute drive from us does get roadside collection, but our road with 7 houses misses out.

I take our recycling to Tarras as it was the only place I know of. I stock pile until I have a car load and sometimes its a challenge to get the recycling in as it can be quite full - sometimes have to take some of it back home again. Last night tried to drop off a blue bag at the skip next to wastebusters but see that has been removed. You are making it difficult for rural people without roadside collection to recycle and get rid of rubbish. I don't take my stuff to Hawea as don't know where it is, and judging by the state it is in from the local papers, you probably wouldn't want me to be doing my recycling and rubbish dumping there.

A conveniently located recycling and rubbish collection point that is always open and gets emptied regularly would be great. Rural people don't come into town so we tend to stock pile recycling and do when we have a car load. I want to celebrate the fantastic work children are doing in our region to support the development of resilient, connected and sustainable communities. I believe we have a generation of children who are intrinsically sustainable in their actions. I want to acknowledge the fantastic work of our enviroschools, teachers, parents and my predecessor Simon Williams. I would like to acknowledge Queenstown-Lakes District Council (QLDC) for supporting young people in our district to be part of the Enviroschools network since 2006. Thank you for this long-term support there is now a network of 13 Enviroschools in our district supported in partnership with Wanaka Wastebusters. This submission requests that QLDC maintains its valuable support of Enviroschools. Spending some of the money Council receives from the Waste Levy on Enviroschools and associated activities is a strategic investment in the district's future. Enviroschools is a holistic programme and this spend helps to satisfy a number of councils strategic objectives: environmental sustainability and low impact living are highly valued, partnering for success, an organisation that demonstrates leadership, quality built environments that meet local needs and respect the local character, communities are inclusive for all. This spend ensures that our kids are supported to become the next generation of bold leaders who have a sound understanding of what it takes to deliver vibrant communities and enduring landscapes in the years to come. We recognise an increase in community demand from parents and teachers. We also have expressions of interest from Early Childhood Centres wishing to join the programme. There has been a significant increase in the student roll in our area and new Early Childhood Centres have opened. We request QLDC work to invest in the ongoing growth and development of the Enviroschools network. We ask that Council considers supporting increased funding to include new centres and to keep pace as the number of children in our district increases. It is very likely that the Waste levy funds will increase over time. Enviroschools is a very useful way to use these funds to support waste reduction in the short, medium and long term.

Kerbside Collection

Kerbside collection in both Township and Rural area has made a big improvement to The Head of the Lake waste management. There are now issues that need further refinement:

Rural bins are collected kerbside, however if the empty bins are not retrieved by residents in a very short time, public waste is often dumped in the bins. We are proposing a new camper rubbish site in Glenorchy aimed at helping to minimise waste dumped in these bins and the waterfront bins; other suggested improvements could include: additional public collection bins in a couple of rural locations - eg Dart Bridge

We should also look at compliance of collection contractors to ensure adequate collection, and minimisation of (for example) fly-away waste which ends up on the side of the road.

We would also look to do regular clean up along the Glenorchy and Rees Valley roads – Currently locals are undertaking clean-up of the road verges Rees Bridge to Glenorchy on a random basis, but there is an opportunity to go community-wide. We would seek Council's support in some degree of traffic management to ensure the safety of volunteers and expand the number of verges cleaned up.

In developing our Waste Management and Minimisation Plan QLDC has chosen to focus on getting glass and organics (garden and food waste) out of the landfill. In addition, the focus is to ensure existing services best meet the needs of the district over the next 6 years. Do you agree with QLDC's preferred focus on recycling glass and organics?

Sustainable Glenorchy supports the focus on minimisation and management of organic waste and glass and support these measures to improve our performance over the long term.

Public rubbish bins in Glenorchy:

The small size of bins (relative to volume of waste) and the low frequency of collection means bins on the waterfront are often overflowing or overfilled.

We would propose a campervan rubbish collection station aimed to minimise the large items in bins (i.e. shopping bags full of household waste). We suggest a station located opposite the fire station, recessed into the current tree-line and roofed-over with lidded bins for household rubbish, glass, recycling and composting. Promotion through DOC, camper apps and localised signage (both within Glenorchy and at tracks) would also be required. We would seek to investigate funding options, potentially through the "tourist tax" and / or coin operation and / or donation boxes.

The site would also provide an opportunity for educational material at the station to raise awareness about waste treatment and waste minimisation.

Organics recycling

Garden material and food waste (organics) makes up around 16% of the material that goes to landfill. Home composting is encouraged and supported with subsidised home systems available to locals. More info here:

Our vision for Glenorchy is to be the most sustainable township in New Zealand and this starts with dealing with our own waste locally where possible.

We have notified members of the subsidy for home composting systems.

The Glenorchy township currently has a garden waste scheme and would seek to expand and improve this as a low-impact method of encouraging greater participation in these schemes without the overhead and carbon footprint of vehicular kerbside collection.

Suggested improvements to the Glenorchy green waste facility could include: improvements for payment collection; concrete pads for the collection site and segmented bins to separate topsoil / small gauge waste / larger gauge waste for firewood; assessment of potential commercial models to provide and improve access to the facility.

SG / GCA are aware of and support the submission by Camp Glenorchy to assess potential for a local composting solution. We would also be supportive of Dr Compost running some community forums to improve education in the area and reduce food waste going to landfill.

We would also like to investigate a compost bin at the proposed campervan rubbish collection site opposite the fire station.

- 1.1 General submissions
- 1.2 Federated Farmers of New Zealand (Inc.) is a voluntary, primary sector organisation representing farming members and their families. Federated Farmers has a long history of representing the needs and interests of New Zealand farming communities, primary producers and agricultural exporters.
- 1.3 The Federation aims to add value to its members' farming businesses by ensuring that New Zealand provides an economic and social environment within which our members may operate their business in a fair, flexible and sustainable manner. Our members strongly support a regional planning approach that recognises landowners play a principle role as managers and users of the region's natural and physical resources.
- 1.4 Overall approach of the plan Federated Farmer supports the considered approach to developing the plan, particularly the background documents, 'Analysis of the Composition of Solid Waste in Queenstown Lakes District' and 'Queenstown Lakes District Council Waste Assessment'. We consider these provide a solid basis for Council to target the proposed Waste Management and Minimisation Plan ("the draft WMMP") to the particular and specific waste management challenges and pressures in the District.

- 1.5 Proposed Vision Council proposes the Vision for the draft WMMP as "Towards zero waste and a sustainable district". Federated Farmers has concerns that the ability to achieve this vision in the near to medium terms faces a number of practical challenges. However, considered in the context of the proposed Goals, Objectives and Targets, it is clear the Vision is intentionally aspirational to provide direction to plan users.
- 1.6 As a result, Federated Farmers supports the proposed Vision on the basis there are no significant amendments to the proposed Goals, Objectives and Targets.
- 1.7 Proposed Goals We note that the proposed objectives for the draft WMMP are those contained in the New Zealand Waste Strategy (NZWS): 1. Improving the efficiency of resource use 2. Reducing harmful effects of waste.
- 1.8 We agree these are useful and relevant goals for the draft WMMP, and it is useful that these align with the NZWS. We also agree with the proposed Objectives for meeting these Goals. The Objectives for Goal 1 (Improving the efficiency of resource use) are: a. Provide and support opportunities to minimise waste through reduction, reuse, recycling and recovery (in priority order) b. Educate and support generators (residents, visitors, and businesses) with options and responsibilities
- 1.9 We consider that, given the growth pressures challenging the District, it is useful to take a user focussed approach, encompassing facilitative, support and educational roles as required across the 'waste chain', with options provided to waste generators to enable them to reduce their waste.
- 1.10 The Objectives for Goal 2 (Reducing harmful effects of waste) are: a. Avoid or mitigate any adverse effects on public health or the environment

- b. Provide effective and efficient waste minimisation and management services supported by the right funding mechanisms.
- 1.11 Again we support these as relevant Objectives for the Goal, under which Council will consider the services and infrastructure owned and managed by Council, and how pricing may incentivise or disincentivise desired behaviours.
- 1.12 Services provided by Council Council outlines the services provided at section 3.1.1 of the draft WMMP. The rural focussed services include: ? Rural refuse collection points? Rural recycling drop off facilities? Rural greenwaste drop off points in Glenorchy, Kingston, Luggate, Hawea and Makorara
- 1.13 From a rural perspective, Federated Farmers considers the Draft WMMP's focus on providing these services in the rural area helps to reduce the risks of 'fly tipping' or inappropriate disposal of urban waste in rural areas.
- 1.14 Broadly speaking, given the geographically spread nature of the district, the different types of waste generation and the growth pressures facing the District, the existing services work well, given the additional monetary and non-monetary costs involved in providing these services.

- 1.15 Agrecovery The one exception to this overall view is the lack of Agrecovery sites in the District. Agrecovery provides New Zealand farmers and growers with nationwide programmes for container recycling, drum recovery, and the collection of unwanted or expired chemicals.
- 1.16 The presence of an Agrecovery site in the Queenstown Lakes District would enable the disposal of this farm specific waste in a sustainable, low cost manner. The development of an Agrecovery site in the District would directly align with the two objectives proposed for the draft WMMP, by improving the efficiency of resource use (by enabling recycling of these products) and reducing the potential harmful effects of waste.
- 1.17 The development of an Agrecovery facility may be feasible on existing Council managed or owned waste disposal or recycling sites, or at the existing Otago Regional Council site on Riverbank Road in Wanaka. In either example Council can reduce the marginal cost to ratepayers by providing an accessible facility at an existing site. In terms of funding, we consider the costs of an Agrecovery site should be funded through the General Rate.
- 1.18 Aside from providing an Agrecovery facility, from a farming perspective we consider the focus on education, including informing farmers of the services available and encouraging the minimisation of waste, is appropriate. Disposal of farming waste comes with specific challenges, including the timing and costs of transport. As a result, opt-in services and the ability to tailor individual farm waste management within environmental and social parameters is important.
- 1.19 We agree that the range of public and private waste management services ensures that public health will be protected. We consider that given the growth in the District there will be increasing viability for additional commercial services, including for farmers.

Summary: Federated Farmers supports the proposed Waste Management and Minimisation Plan.

We ask Council to develop an Agrecovery site in the Queenstown Lakes District, ideally incorporated into existing Council (including Otago Regional Council) owned or managed waste sites that are accessible to the farming community, to be funded through the General Rate.

- 2.1 Costs of the current level of service and proposed funding approach
- 2.2 The draft WMMP outlines the costs associated with waste management and minimisation, although it is unclear whether these costs have been updated to include forecasts of the costs in future years.
- 2.3 Federated Farmers supports Council's current funding policy in respect to funding these activities. Our support is heavily dependent on the current rating and funding policies of Council, including use of differentials and uniform charges for the General rate funded components of the WMMP activity, and use of targeted rates for specific

services.

- 2.4 Provided there are no material changes to Council's overall funding policies, we have no objection to the proposed methods of funding outlined on pages 19 to 22 of the draft WMMP. Although these are largely 'urban focussed' activities the proposed methods for funding (including fees and user charges) appropriately balances the public and private good components of the waste management activities.
- 2.5 We particularly support the practical nature, and recognition of the need for alignment for existing and potential future agrichemical disposal schemes under the action: 'Provide dropoff facilities at the Council transfer stations for agrichemicals to an extent that they are affordable and complement national schemes or services.'

Summary: Federated Farmers supports the proposed approach to funding the Waste Management and Minimisation Plan, provided there are no significant changes to Council's General and Targeted Rates funding policies.

3R Group would like to congratulate the Council for the effort and consideration invested in the Draft Waste Management and Minimisation Plan (WMMP) and the resulting consultation process.

Queenstown has experienced rapid growth over recent years. Growth in both residential and tourism numbers places significant pressure on existing facilities and services, including waste and recycling. From a tourism viewpoint, there is an expectation for first world recycling facilities to match New Zealand's clean and green image.

3R believes that the goals, objectives and targets contained within the document present a number of practical and easy to achieve options that have the potential to reverse the upward spiral of waste generation and lead to greater recovery of resource from the waste stream.

It is encouraging to see the diversion of glass being prioritised as part of the WMMP. As Glass Packaging Forum Scheme Managers, 3R are working to increase both the quality and quantity of glass available for recycling, throughout New Zealand. Over recent years, the Council has been on the receiving end of negative media coverage when it was disclosed that collected glass was in fact being sent to landfill. Glass Packaging Forum – Submission on Waste Management and Minimisation Plan (WMMP)

Thank you for the opportunity to contribute to this well communicated consultation process on how Council hopes to address waste and recycling over the next six years.

The Glass Packaging Forum (The Forum) connects businesses that sell glass-packaged consumer goods with those that collect and recycle glass. This enables glass to be returned to the furnace or made into alternative products, with the aim of zero container glass to landfill.

The success of the Forum is dependent on maintaining strong relationships with local and central government, waste management companies, recyclers, private industry and community groups, to promote and facilitate the recovery of glass. The Forum also provides grant funding for projects that improve New Zealand's glass recycling rates.

3R Group Ltd were appointed scheme manager for the Glass Packaging Forum in April 2017. They are specialists in resource recovery and product stewardship and will be working closely with GPF stakeholders to increase the quality and volume of glass available for recycling and other uses. This submission is from the Forum Scheme Managers.

The GPF has recently funded a number of glass bottles banks for Queenstown Lakes District Council (QLDC) as well as funding facility improvements at both Wanaka Waste Busters and Alexandra to allow for increased quality and quantity of glass available for recyclina.

WMMP Recycling Options

The Forum supports the goal, objectives and targets contained within the WMMP. The Forum is particularly interested in actions that could lead to increased container glass recycling. The Statement of proposal states that there is particular need to consider options for both organic and glass diversion and that glass recycling has community support. How this will be addressed other than under objective 4 of the Draft WMMP is not clear.

Councils kerbside recycling collection uses a commingled collection methodology, where all recyclable material is collected in one bin. While this is convenient for the resident, commingled collections can lead to a loss in value of some recycling materials due to contamination and is part of the reason the majority of glass is currently sent to landfill.

Nationally, the source separation of recycling at the kerbside is receiving renewed interest as Councils and contractors strive to keep glass separate to other recyclables. The kerbside sorting of glass, i.e. keeping glass separate from all other recyclables, instead of co-mingling, has been shown to result in the following:

- A significant increase in the volume of glass that can be recycled (cullet);
- Reduced contamination of other materials, such as paper, that will allow for higher value onshore processing;
- A reduction in the use of virgin material; and To maximise glass recovery and the use of cullet, O-I, New Zealand's only glass manufacture, needs to receive colour-sorted glass, i.e. green, brown and clear (flint).

Over recent years, the Council has been on the receiving end of negative media coverage when it was disclosed that collected glass was in fact being sent to landfill. This WMMP consultation process provides the Council with the opportunity to ensure the collection methodology and processing for container glass is progressed; especially considering that glass is 100% recyclable, right here in New Zealand. Alternative options to kerbside glass collection is to extend the number of glass bottle banks throughout the district and to increase public access to these facilties. There is also the possibility for Council to work with the kerbside contractor to provide a specific glass drop off facility at their processing yard. This approach would provide colour sorted cullet for very little effort and could be operated alongside a kerbside collection. This is an approach already operated in many areas of New Zealand. Summary

The Forum supports the actions that will lead to increased glass recycling for kerbside recycling contained within the WMMP. There is clear evidence that this approach, along with other initiatives proposed by council will improve both the quantity and quality of glass cullet supplied to O-I for recycling.

The forum believes the consideration of a 'glass out' recycling collection along with increasing the number of the bottle banks and the provision of a glass drop off facility at the kerbside contractor facility will reduce the amount of glass sent to landfill.

We believe the current kerbside waste collection system (2 open bins and blue bags) should be dispensed with and replaced by lidded wheelie bins for the following reasons:

- 1. The blue rubbish bags are often rummaged through by dogs when left out over night or the collection time is later in the day the result, rubbish, often offensive organics, is strewn about the street and the collectors will not pick it up.
- 2. The contents of the open bins for 'all other recyclables' (plastic bottles, paper and cardboard) are often blown out of the bin and scattered down the street. Further the contents can become rain soaked.
- 3. Wheelie bins with lids overcome the problems referred to above.
- 4. The cost of blue bags obviously goes towards off-setting/reducing the rubbish rate but, as in many other jurisdictions, the cost of a total wheelie bin system is simply built into the rubbish rate. Further, blue bags add more single-use plastic bags into the waste stream.

We compost all our food waste and mulch garden waste.

We have some doubts about kerbside organics collections because:

- 1. the cost will be high for a collection service that will be 'patchy' for individual properties ie. occasional, seasonally determined.
- 2. ratepayers who responsibly compost and mulch their organics will end up subsidising those who don't.
- 3. having lived in two cities that had organics collection, bins were often over-filled leading to rubbish in the streets, and unhygienic.
- A better alternative is that ratepayers are encouraged to use a local organics disposal depot where the cost is subsidised by Council

Glass should simply not be going to landfill. However, if the economics of recycling it are so bad, then the least Council should do is crush all glass to reduce the bulk in landfill.

Of course - who wouldn't want to see more and better information in both areas. But where we believe information and education has been particularly lacking is in the area of waste minimisation.

And this is because individually it is hard to do,eg. indivdually we often have no choice but to accept items in the packaging they come in. Waste minimisation, to be effective needs to start at the macro or industry level, ie. the supermarket and building supply companies and chains for example. Local government and central government have a responsibility to lead on this issue, but we see little enthusiasm or evidence that they are doing so. Both are abrogating their responsibility it would seem for fear of upsetting 'big business' and instead leaving it to local grass roots groups to effect change.

Along with more information and education should go COMPLIANCE, ie. more rigorous sanctions for those who do not comply on the reduction of and illegal disposal of waste, especially waste that is harmful to the environment and public health.

The building industry has for too long been able to get away with building waste disposal on the 'one skip fits-all' basis. It is not good enough for Council to simply say that the construction industry will address this issue it will not! And to suggest any real action on tightening up on construction and demolition waste be delayed ("not focussed on") for the next 6 years is totally unacceptable.

Another Rubbish collection day in town and another day where rubbish is spread around bins, poor recycling habits are obvious, and torn Blue Bags are gotten into by animals scavenging for food scraps.

I wonder if this could be different?

The population of Wanaka has grown rapidly over recent years-consequence: the new residents are not aware of what is rubbish/recycling habits are appropriate. It is also obvious that many households are short term rented and have guest staying-consequence: people do not know what recycling service is available, or how to manage rubbish collection.

How about an rubbish education plan? Is there one? I didn't see anything in the 10 year plan.

Suggestions

QLDC could produce and provide a pamphlet or magnet for each household outlining how to manage rubbish and recycling for collection. (Not a booklet, but a quirky graphic leaflet/magnet)

Something tangible to be referred to, whether for a long term resident or short term visitor. A reminder or quick reference)

This could be provided to each household... enabling education and awareness. Here's a chance to be proactive.

When was the last time this information was distributed? (people aren't going to look up a website for this information- make it easy for them)

Things that stand out could include;

- "Out at Gate by 8" (not the night before when animals can tear bags to feast on food scraps at their leisure) (Face it, you can't control straying animals at night.)
- Encourage composting, get the food out of the waste stream- make it easy for guests. Eg Bokashi bins- It's super/great that QLDC subsiding the bins, however,

people need to know about it) even better- organic waste collection such as Christchurch has.

- Recycling: list what is recycled eg #1-7? Paper, Card, Tins, Glass
- Point out the importance of clean recycling items, flattened card, piled papers, lids of containers and bottles (as Wastebusters does not have to contract for kerbside, they no longer provide that information as they used to-day's gone by)

Regardless of whether 'recycling' is contracted out, ultimately the bigger goal is to reduce the amount of waste to the landfill... So educating people at the household level, reduces the amount to gets rejected at the end of recycling sorting, and ends up at in the landfill anyway.

Plus, what goes on at the kerbside falls into the QLDC's lap... clean streets, reducing methane gas in landfills, rubbish collection ease...all benefit the QLDC community, and the global impact we humans have.

So, this is my suggestion. Please consider it.

This I write after I spent the morning picking up rubbish, rebagging food infiltrated blue bags, and mis appropriate recycling. It happens every week, to some level, somewhere along the township streets

Kerbside Collection

Kerbside collection in both Township and Rural area has made a big improvement to The Head of the Lake waste management. There are now issues that need further refinement:

Rural bins are collected kerbside, however if the empty bins are not retrieved by residents in a very short time, public waste is often dumped in the bins. We are proposing a new camper rubbish site in Glenorchy aimed at helping to minimise waste dumped in these bins and the waterfront bins; other suggested improvements

could include: additional public collection bins in a couple of rural locations - eg Dart Bridge

We should also look at compliance of collection contractors to ensure adequate collection, and minimisation of (for example) fly-away waste which ends up on the side of the road.

We would also look to do regular clean up along the Glenorchy and Rees Valley roads – Currently locals are undertaking clean-up of the road verges Rees Bridge to Glenorchy on a random basis, but there is an opportunity to go community-wide. We would seek Council's support in some degree of traffic management to ensure the safety of volunteers and expand the number of verges cleaned up.

Waste Management and Minimisation Plan 2018

In developing our Waste Management and Minimisation Plan QLDC has chosen to focus on getting glass and organics (garden and food waste) out of the landfill. In addition, the focus is to ensure existing services best meet the needs of the district over the next 6 years. Do you agree with QLDC's preferred focus on recycling glass and organics?

Sustainable Glenorchy supports the focus on minimisation and management of organic waste and glass and support these measures to improve our performance over the long term.

Public rubbish bins in Glenorchy:

The small size of bins (relative to volume of waste) and the low frequency of collection means bins on the waterfront are often overflowing or overfilled.

We would propose a campervan rubbish collection station aimed to minimise the large items in bins (i.e. shopping bags full of household waste). We suggest a station located opposite the fire station, recessed into the current tree-line and roofed-over with lidded bins for household rubbish, glass, recycling and composting. Promotion through DOC, camper apps and localised signage (both within Glenorchy and at tracks) would also be required. We would seek to investigate funding options, potentially through the "tourist tax" and / or coin operation and / or donation boxes.

The site would also provide an opportunity for educational material at the station to raise awareness about waste treatment and waste minimisation.

Organics recycling

Garden material and food waste (organics) makes up around 16% of the material that goes to landfill. Home composting is encouraged and supported with subsidised home systems

Our vision for Glenorchy is to be the most sustainable township in New Zealand and this starts with dealing with our own waste locally where possible.

We have notified members of the subsidy for home composting systems.

The Glenorchy township currently has a garden waste scheme and would seek to expand and improve this as a low-impact method of encouraging greater participation in these schemes without the overhead and carbon footprint of vehicular kerbside collection.

Suggested improvements to the Glenorchy green waste facility could include: improvements for payment collection; concrete pads for the collection site and segmented bins to separate topsoil / small gauge waste / larger gauge waste for firewood; assessment of potential commercial models to provide and improve access to the facility.

SG / GCA are aware of and support the submission by Camp Glenorchy to assess potential for a local composting solution. We would also be supportive of Dr Compost running some community forums to improve education in the area and reduce food waste going to landfill.

We would also like to investigate a compost bin at the proposed campervan rubbish collection site opposite the fire station.

Not just microplastics though- in recent times several whales washed up dead have been found to have many kilograms of plastic in their stomachs. And not just whales but turtles and sea birds too.

I believe Queenstown can become a global leader in tackling the enourmous issues of plastics by making a few small changes and showing our international visitors what is possible! Ban plastic bags and bottled water at supermarkets, put in more water refill stations around town. Ban plastic straws and in hospitality. Ban plastic cutlery for takeaway food. 



Think bigger education for industry, not just motivated individuals.

Draft Waste Management and Minimisation Plan Submission 2018 M Farrier

- 1. I agree that the Council should lead waste minimisation as required by the Resource Management Act and Waste Minimisation Act.
- 2. I agree with the Statement in Appendix A.

Because of the high number of tourists, statistics on waste are skewed (e.g. the volume of waste generated per usual resident population is inaccurate as the data includes all waste generated by the visitor industry), and it means that solutions to district speci?c issues need to focus on the needs of both the resident and non-resident. This visitor impact is more pronounced in Queenstown Lakes District than in other districts of New Zealand.

3. I agree in general with the proposal to try to continue to minimise waste to land? II.

- 4. I believe that the costs associated with waste disposal should be shared between the point of sale and the user. I believe that all costs associated with waste disposal, recycling and the cash ?ow for recycled goods should be transparent to the ratepayer.
- 5. I do not support a general rate as such to ?nance the proposed waste minimisation programme
- 6. I note that I have been paying for both direct waste disposal to land? II (through user pays) and indirect disposal to land? II through recycling. I consider that this is a form of double dipping. If I am charged through a general rate for recycling I expect that all material will be recycled. I expect that under contract conditions that the contractor has both bene? ts and risk.
- 7. If material is not being recycled I expect to be informed so I can place it in the waste bag or bin myself and not be charged twice.
- 8. I accept that transport costs for recycled material from the area for export or reuse are high.
- 9. The recycling of some waste streams is already subsidised by the importer and or producer of the products on a national basis. For example, glass bottles, used oil and possibly tyres.
- 10. Recycled material has a value and yet this has not been discussed in any detail in the report. In my opinion the Council should bene?t from funds recovered if the Council has to pay land?ll charges for recycled material sent to land?lled. The following table is extracted from the Ministry for The Environment Report 2007 Recycling Cost Bene?t Analysis I believe price in the table for glass should be \$75 not as shown. The table was produced in 2007 and the quoted prices are likely to be very di?erent.

- 11. I support glass being handled as a seperate stream and suggest that cans (aluminium and steel) should also be considered for collection in the same stream.
- 12. I support organic collection provided costs are kept transparent. I do not mind paying for the collection of organic waste from my property, however, I believe that the collection of street tree debris (leaves and branches) is a cost on Council.
- 13. I note that sludge from the sewage treatment plant is discussed. I assume that the disposal of the sludge in included with waste water charges and ratepayers will not be charged twice for disposal. In my experience there are many opportunities

for double dipping in regard to recycling and waste disposal; hence the need for full transparency.

- 14. In my onion there are opportunities for Queenstown, Wanaka and Arrowtown businesses to set an example in regard to waste minimisation and product stewardship. The food/restaurant industry could be a New Zealand leader in composting all food waste they produce and seek a grant from the Waste Minimisation Fund to do this.
- 15. No mention is made of cooking oils and fats in the reports these should be addressed; so that the method of disposal is appropriately tracked.
- 16. Builders and tradesmen in the district could set an example to the rest of New Zealand by establishing recycling and re-use schemes for material that they discard. For example, timber, gib wall board, scrap metal, clean ?II, etc.. This could be another opportunity to seek for Waste Minimisation Fund support.
- 17. The QLDC needs to identify a more equitable way of paying for recycling and solid waste litter bins. The cost for these do not lie with the residential ratepayer since they are much more likely to be used by visitors and retail outlets. The costs associated with the operation of litter bins should be shown separately.
- 18. No mention is made of street litter other than litter bins. One method of highlighting where street litter originates is to conduct a litter survey and classify into the various sources. This can be used as a "stick" to publicise which outlet stores and or manufacturers the litter originates from, even though they are not directly responsible for the littering.
- 19. In regard to the waste collection contact it is suggested that this is controlled better (either in the contract or through policing) in regard to leaving debris on the roadside on collection day. I accept some of this may be related to the plastic bags being torn by animals, however, it does not give a good look.



Council letter for funding of Enviroschools

Dear Council, Queenstown Primary School has been an Enviroschool for the past 10 years. We have had invaluable support from our Enviroschool facilitator over this time to incorporate sustainable education into our classroom learning.

Some of the things we have managed to do with this support is grow and plant kowhai on DOC and council land, as well as run Enviroschool Action groups. These groups have been run by students to solve environmental problems in our school often about reducing rubbish, energy usage, and recycling issues. The Enviro Facilitator has helped run these sessions. We have Enviroschool Leaders who talk to teachers and students to ensure consultation is happening with each project and who lead the group with the research and decision making within the group.

Other activities that the facilitator has helped us with are running staff meetings to motivate and ensure we are up to date with resources and inspiring activities, encouraging litterless lunches, helping us to include sustainable environmental aspects in our inquiry planning, providing school resources and fostering community contacts for our school activities.

The Enviroschool position in schools is a fundamental support for inspiring our young people, encouraging them to be critical thinkers and problem solvers for the future and through them encourage sustainability through to our families and wider community.

An important activity for our younger classes is understanding the impact on how the litter in their lunchboxes affects our environment. With the input of our Enviro facilitator we have been problem solving how to reduce this litter, what we can use instead of throw away packages. With some extra assistance our long term hope is to make sustainable sandwich envelopes for parents/children/teachers to use. Our facilitator is helping to run and set up these sessions.



Glass and organics are important, however, construction waste such as rubble and timber is also VERY important considering over 30% of our waste in the district is just that. Council could use incentives and education to engage construction workers and companies to dispose of their waste responsibly. Council could use the current transfer station on Glenda Drive, connect with community groups such as Sea Shepard and Sustainable Queenstown, and/or partner with private businesses such as All Waste to create a drop off shed/barn for construction workers to drop off their excess reusable waste to avoid paying landfill charges, which the shed organiser could on-sell to the public for an extremely cheap rate: REUSE. There could also be an incentive for new home builders to use more sustainable materials in return for subsidised rates.

Due to the transient population in Queenstown, the visitors and the short and long-term renters who either do not have access to a big enough garden space to compost or are not here for long enough to see the project through, it is simply not enough to encourage people to compost at home. This initiative, although helpful for the people who have the space and time to compost, is inefficient for many people who visit or live in Queenstown.

Cafes, restaurants and hotels in the district should also have a food waste collection service considering the majority of the food waste in the area is likely to be from those tourism outlets.

Perhaps, again, Council could encourage community initiatives, partnerships and community enterprises to ensure the needs of the community are best met.

Education is key to ensure most people are washing and separating their glass to ensure it's ability to be recycled. However, the current system of sending all mixed glass to landfill at the moment is so wasteful and unnecessary.

Perhaps providing each small community (eg. Fernhill, Sunshine Bay, QT Central, Arthur's Point etc.) with bottle banks (separate bins for each glass type) and not allowing glass in recycling bins at all would be effective. This would need to be policed by the people who collect our bins each week. See-through bins would be effective as Perth are currently using.

Again, supporting community initiatives and groups, or private enterprises to ensure that the glass is being sorted and recycled properly takes the responsibility solely from Council.

Unfortunately, many people are unaware of how much of the content from our recycling bins are actually going to landfill. There is also no emphasis on refusing disposable and unnecessary waste in the community. Refusing should be the first port of call when thinking of wasteful items. The 5 R's should be used to educate the community on how to live with and consume less waste in the first place. Recycling should be the VERY last step for a good no longer wanted. 1. Refuse, 2. Reduce, 3. Reuse, 4. Repurpose, 5. Recycle, in that order!

Council could introduce a bylaw to ban all single-use plastic items from our district as Wellington Waterfront has just done with plastic straws. This would take a large proportion of our waste out of the picture completely.

Bars and restaurants would be encouraged to use alternatives which many are already doing by offering compostable takeaway containers and cutlery and the community would be educated by seeing this ban and the examples set by the businesses.

Perhaps by reducing bin collection services to fortnightly, people would be forced to reduce their waste. This would save money on staff, fuel and resources, reduce the carbon footprint by using less fuel, encourage people to refuse waste and in turn reduce waste,

Perhaps also increasing the price of wheelie bins and blue plastic bins which would encourage more people to sort their rubbish and put the appropriate waste in the recycling bin.

Also, using clear bins to encourage people to only dispose of unnecessary items. Providing households with green wheelie bins for green waste for composting would be greatly appreciated.

I, like most others who know the truth, am appalled at the amount of recyclable material currently being sent to Victoria Flats and Council must act to implement a more responsible method of sorting waste and actually recycling it and this SHOULD be an immediate driver for this Waste Minimisation Management Plan.

The tonnes of waste dumped per capita each year in the QLDC is one of the highest in NZ and reflects badly on the QLD Council. Wanaka appears to have a much better record of a much lower % of collected rubbish that goes to landfill, compared to the Queenstown basin.

Why is this?

Are the present landfill and rubbish collection contractors incentivised in any way to maximise the tonnes dumped in the landfill? If the answer is yes, then their contacts need to be reviewed immediately.

Set very large dumping fees for mixed waste compared with sorted (by the person dumping) to make it financially very attractive for the dumper to sort out their load into different areas.

It is recommended that the QLDC sets a target of tonnes of waste per capita to landfill that is no more than the median figure for other councils in NZ, within the next 5 years.

The current exceptionally high tonnes per capita for QLDC are scandalous (despite the bleating that it is because of our high tourist numbers) and the Council needs to implement strong & immediate measures that attack the most important contributors to the problem (rubble & building materials) as their top priority rather than giving the impression of taking politically popular actions e.g. worm farms) that merely "nibble around the edges" .

House after house are putting out recycle bins stacked with rubbish all mixed together. Bins and boxes containing paper, bottles, as well as household rubbish that isn't able to be recycled which clearly should be in the blue bag for the landfill.

Recently while walking I encountered the recycling contractor out on his round. The location coincided with bins and boxes load up as described. In expectation that the contractor was about to sort through all this stuff and separate it into the correct area in his vehicle and trailer, I told him it was ridiculous and not really his job to sort and separate the items. He replied that he didn't do that. He said that when it occurs he just removes all the items and places everything in the back of the truck for compacting and disposal at the landfill. You couldn't blame him for acting this way. He told me that only 10-20% of households place items out as requested by Council.

I don't know whether this is a sign of ignorance, laziness or contrived behaviour intended to avoid the cost of disposing of rubbish in a blue bag – probably a bit of all three, but, even if the contractor was exaggerating the proportions, its clear there's a huge amount of items ending up in the landfill that shouldn't be there and the cost of that is being transferred to all ratepayers instead of the individual. So my submission is that the QLDC need to:

- 1) Commence an education programme as outlined in the Planning Document, but with a strong emphasis on the Council's expectations of separating rubbish and recyclables. This will need to include a mailbox drop, radio advertising, and publicity in the Wanaka App as well as corresponding with absentee owners asking them to leave instructions for visitors to their houses
- 2) Instruct contractors not to empty bins and boxes at all if their contents are contaminated or are not sorted and separated as required.





The QLDC's ideas for bio solids treatment and disposal lacks both detail and accuracy. We have investigated the options for bio solid drying, incineration and land disposal and are happy to share our findings and knowledge. Will vermicomposting handle the intended volumes and has the QLDC got consent to store bio solids in the open at Victoria.

A multi pronged approach is needed.

Has the QLDC done a costing option on per ton cost of solar drying through the Project Groundswell proposal. What is the options for the disposal of the dried material produced. Victoria won't accept bio solids of any dry solid percentage, period.

S.J Allen Holdings has been transporting large volumes of QLDC Bio solids for a long time and facilitated the Kings Bend option in conjunction with the CODC. Currently if Kings Bend were to refuse QLDC bio solids then the shit would really hit the fan. Removal and disposal of bio solids needs to be a TOP priority for the QLDC.

The QLDC needs to concentrate immediately on what is easier to change and focus their resources there.

1) Construction waste, the onus again should be placed on the originator to sort at source (the building site) What are the options for construction waste. Could it be

fuel for a bio solid incinerator or drying plant. Where is it stored what are the other options for it.

- 2) Glass crushing. We have a proposal for this. It reduces the human factor of accurate sorting and recycling, reduces costs and has an end use. Again talk to us we have ideas. Start with commercial collection and tie the premises registration to compliance with recycling and collection.
- 3) Don't waste resources on trying to educate the public and visitors to recycling in public areas. It doesn't work. I piece of rubbish contaminant in recycling means it has to be rejected. Same applies for events. Short of having someone man every rubbish & recycling bin to sort at source it is impossible to have compliant recycling from events. Again we are the biggest event provider in the South Island. Talk to us. Ask your contractors and your recycling/transfer stations. Public/Event recycling doesn't work. Concentrate in the areas where you can make a difference you won't win them all.
- 4) Organic kerbside collection is a good idea.

QLDC needs to stop creating monopolies. Explanation --

- 1) Allwaste run the transfer stations, have the kerbside collection contract and commercial collection. There is no competitive environment. There is no will to change because they make their money from bin lifts and weight. Open kerbside collection to competition.
- 2) Smart Environmental is the same they run the plant (which is a disgrace. More like a tip) and they have the kerbside & commercial collection. There is no will for them to change because they make their money from volume which you are trying to reduce.

There needs to be a broader discussion with the major industry players and QLDC staff need to be empowered to adopt private sector initiatives when presented. Lets do this now and do it right. Delay any contract renewals until you have a clear coherent plan.

My moto is "local solutions to local challenges". We live in a unique place with unique challenges. It is not Auckland, Wellington or Vancouver.

Submission from Plastic Bag Free Wanaka

We would like to be heard in support of our submission

About Us Plastic Bag Free Wanaka is a group of hard working, committed and passionate volunteers. Our vision is for Wanaka to be plastic bag free by 2019 and for a reduction of single use plastic in our community and across New Zealand. Through fun events and education, we show people the harm done by single use plastics and make it easy and affordable to choose reusable options. We advocate for national action and collaboration to reduce single use plastics used in New Zealand.

There is a groundswell of community support for our organisation and our communities are actively looking for solutions to the problem of single use and other plastics. As a small, voluntary organisation we can only achieve so much and we look to council to provide services, policies and education to help our communities work towards zero waste.

Overall comment Overall, we do not think the draft Waste Management and Minimisation is ambitious enough to achieve the vision of zero waste and a sustainable district. We would like to see a greater focus on reduction of waste alongside recycling and reuse. We are extremely concerned about single use plastics in our communities and would like to see more education and awareness around alternatives and waste reduction at the source.

We would like to see ambitious diversion targets set for our district.

Organic Waste We support council's focus on organic waste as a priority. We would like to see a user pays system for organic waste. We do not support a system where those residents and businesses who compost their organic waste themselves are subsidising services they do not choose to use.

Queenstown Glass Recycling Landfilling of Queenstown glass is the result of council choosing a recycling system that does not create high quality products for recycling. Whilst we agree that this issue should be a priority for council and our district we feel that it could have been avoided by choosing a system where materials are separated at the source. We encourage the council to learn from this when letting of future waste management contracts and to specific better outcomes for our communities and the environment rather than defaulting to the lowest cost providers.

Support for community groups working on waste reduction We would like to see greater support (financial and in kind) for community groups and enterprises working on waste reduction. The QLDC events fund is not set up to support smaller events with a threshold of \$5,000 and

a lengthy, involved application process that is weighted towards large events that bring economic value to our region. We would like to see a separate fund to support smaller community events and educational workshops.

Support for Container Deposit Legislation Would like to see QLDC actively supporting the campaign for Container Deposit Legislation. Container deposit systems are a simple mechanism that is proved to significantly reduce litter and increase recycling rates.

After 20 years of voluntary measures, New Zealand's beverage container recycling rates remain persistently low (estimated at less than 40%), compared to states with CDSs that routinely achieve rates of between 85 and 95%. (Source: Envision "The Incentive to Recycle, The Case for a Container Deposit Legislation for NZ", September 2015).

Education We wholeheartedly support the continuation of existing education programs including Dr Compost and school education being delivered successfully by Wastebusters. We would like to see this extended to include more education around reduction of waste and recycling to increase recycling rates and reduce contamination.

Construction and Demolition Waste We support the council's efforts to reduce the amount of construction and demolition waste going to landfill. We suggest the council investigate adopting a similar process as for Zero Waste events where builders or landowners are required to complete a simple waste management plan which shows the type of waste they will be creating and how this will be disposed of. At a minimum all building sites should be recycling cardboard and shrink wrap and, in Wanaka, polystyrene also.

We encourage the council to be bold and ambitious in their efforts to work towards zero waste

QLDC WMMP submission April 2018 Submission on the Draft Waste management and Minimisation Plan on behalf of Wastebusters, a community enterprise working for zero waste.

Prepared by Sue Coutts Wastebusters General Manager So why do we all bother? Waste matters more to us than almost any other district in NZ. Our brand, reputation and future prosperity are tied to the clean, green New Zealand visitors expect to find when they hop off the plane. The high expectations of visitors are echoed by those of residents who put environmental sustainability and low impact living at the top of their values list.

Council has signalled it's intention to take a bold, strategic approach to resolving the districts infrastructure issues. Waste is a flagship activity for demonstrating commitment to sustainability. A high proportion of visitors expect to see visible evidence of state of the art recycling systems as proof that we are serious about protecting our environment.

We need to make the shift from managing our districts waste problems to solving them. We can't afford to be on the back foot in the face of a 30% increase in ave daily population over the next ten years. QLDC has the opportunity to set the bar for what NZ can achieve by taking a proactive approach to dealing with waste.

QLDC can change the game by investing strategically for the future. At the district level we need to shift away from spending on transfer stations for rubbish towards investing in resource recovery parks that work for the circular economy. That would set businesses, residents and visitors up with the infrastructure they need to do the right thing with products and materials at the end of their lives.

QLDC has a lot of power to influence decisions made by Central Government and we should be using this to lobby for key pieces of the waste reduction puzzle to be put in place. This Government has signalled an intention to refocus on the waste reduction and minimisation initiatives we need to build the circular economy and support our clean, green brand.

To achieve this we need to expand and increase the waste levy, introduce Container Deposit Schemes and put mandatory Product Stewardship schemes in place for tyres, E-waste and Agricultural chemicals. If we don't take this opportunity to implement the provisions of the Waste Minimisation Act 2008 residents will continue to pay a high price for dealing with increasing waste arisings for many years to come.

QLDC has a good track record for responsibly managing our districts rubbish. We need to shift focus and invest to develop high quality recycling systems that meet the expectations of residents and visitors. These systems need to be built with the end user of the products in

mind. That would see; glass meeting the specs for bottle to bottle recycling and high quality organic material feeding our soil.

To succeed in this QLDC needs partners that share its bold strategic goals. Central Government has signalled its commitment to create a playing field that supports waste reduction and minimisation. A hands on approach at the district level will ensure the WMMP gets traction because it's the face to face connections that inspire people from all walks of life to get behind shared goals and go the extra mile it takes to make things happen.

Council can use a strategic procurement approach to resource engaged individuals and communities, purpose driven social enterprises and forward thinking businesses to deliver services that do more than just meet service level objectives. Choosing partners that share councils goals will enable council to get more for its money by resourcing organisations and contractors that will drive change and work for zero waste.

User pays is an important tool for driving waste reduction and minimisation. Those that do the right thing should be rewarded with lower cost of service. Pay as you throw is a key principle that needs to be applied to all rubbish services. It should also apply to all commercial recycling activity so the costs of more recycling are covered by the user.

The best way to reduce the costs and risks of waste is not to make or buy it in the first place. Investing in waste reduction strategies is the number one way our district can save money and energy in the long run. Zero waste, reduction, reuse and resource recovery are on the rise in popular culture. This is an ideal time for QLDC to commit to a bold new approach that leads us into the future and steps away from past problems.

Scientific evidence supports the view that zero waste is not only a good investment it's also successful, scientific, learning and growing, controversial and challenging the status quo, measurable, socially and culturally beneficial.

Wastebusters has been working for zero waste in our district and across New Zealand for almost 20 years. Over that time we have seen support for waste reduction and diversion come and go. Right now there is a real sense of opportunity in our industry and we hope that QLDC takes this chance to make the best use of the favourable times we find ourselves in.

Comments on WMMP section 2. Vision, Goals, Objectives, Targets Make Reduction a focus area It's time to stop managing our waste problems. We need to invest in solving them.

If we want our district to lead the way in the destination management space and to make this a great place to live, we need to make reduction of waste a priority for our district. The current waste management focus serves to maintain the status quo. A waste minimisation focus would challenge us all to think outside the box and shift to a whole system approach. Until this happens, we will face ever increasing capex and operational budget lines for waste management.

We need to align our districts investments, procurement processes, strategies, partnering arrangements and service level activities to prioritise waste minimisation. If we do that we

have a great chance of being able to make rapid progress towards zero waste and a sustainable district. We are diverting 30% of our districts waste now. Other communities in New Zealand and around the globe have reached 75% and 80% targets. The tools we need to make the jump are right there.

We need to switch our thinking to design waste out of the system over time and use positive levers to change people's behaviour. We need a whole system approach to make the shift from managing ever increasing volumes of waste to reducing waste over time.

To deliver on our WMMP's vision: "towards zero waste and a sustainable district" we need to take a bold and proactive approach. Reducing waste needs to be at the top of the priority list. This is critical for QLDC residents who highly value environmental sustainability and low impact living and for meeting the expectations of the tourists and visitors who stream into our district every year.

In 2007 the Auditor General reviewed TA progress in implementing their Waste management and minimisation plans. QLDC was one of 6 councils selected for an audit. 1 Found that "despite the progress they had made, the 6 districts managed steady or increasing quantities of waste in recent years." The auditor general found that the 6 councils "favoured waste diversion and waste disposal activities rather than waste reduction. Thus most of their activities involved managing waste that had been generated rather than reducing the quantity of waste generated."

These comments are as true today as they were 11 years ago. The Auditor General pointed to the purpose of the Waste Minimisation Act 2008, "to encourage waste minimisation and a decrease in waste disposal to protect the environment from harm and provide environmental, social, economic, and cultural benefits."

To achieve this purpose they suggested framing WMMP implementation efforts in three separate bundles in line with waste hierarchy priorities as follows:

1. Waste reduction - reduce waste at source 2. Waste diversion - reduce waste to landfill 3. Waste treatment and disposal - collect, transport and landfill

We note that Auckland Council has chosen to use this format to define the primary goals for Auckland's 2018 WMMP. 2

1. Minimise waste generation 2. Maximise opportunities for resource recovery 3. Reduce harm from residual waste

We suggest that QLDC frames up it's WMMP goals in a similar way. Dividing the goal "improving the efficiency of resource use" into two parts, one with a reduction focus and the 1 ?Waste Management planning by Territorial Authorities 2 ?Auckland Council Draft WMMP 2018 Wastebusters submission on QLDC WMMP April 2018 5

other with a resource recovery focus makes it less abstract. Then it's easier to see how the initiatives and actions of various players can help achieve these goals.

This would enable alignment of investments, procurement processes, strategies, partnering arrangements and service level activities behind each of the three goals so it is clear which part of the hierarchy capex, opex and energy are being applied to. Objectives and priorities would also line up behind these goals.

It would be easy to see whether resources and attention are being spread across the hierarchy goals in the most effective and efficient way. It would also create clear sightlines for reporting on achievements. These would be easy to align with LTP statements e.g p100 Vol 1 says that Waste Management is managed in three subactivities: ? Waste management and minimisation and recycling ? Refuse collection ? Landfill provision We think this is a bit confusing as waste management is also used as a general umbrella term for all waste related activities. We think the three tier framework we have suggested is a more useful way of structuring thinking about investment and action under the "Waste" umbrella.

Council is required to consider the Waste Hierarchy in priority order and using the three tier framework in each relevant document would make it very obvious where there are gaps that need attention. For example this would flow through into the activity lists in the LTP vol 2 p146 which contains specific outlines of activity: landfill provision and management, activity: refuse collection and activity: recycling. However there are no activities listed that have a waste reduction focus.

It is likely that current spending and attention are allocated along the following lines.

Waste management focus area - internal and contract activities Guestimate on proportion Guestimate on spend based on 2017/18 opex budgets Waste reduction Minimise waste generation 1-3% Less than \$300,000 per year Waste diversion Max opportunities for resource recovery 25%+ More than \$2 million per year Waste disposal Reduce harm from residual waste 70+% More than \$7 million per year

This spend is in line with councils reported diversion rate of 29%. Seeing it laid out like this makes it very easy to see what councils investment focus is. The old sayings "You get what you pay for" and What you pay attention to grows stronger" are useful to hold in mind when considering how QLDC could structure WMMP activity and budget lines to drive change rather than maintain the status quo. For example it would cost very little to double the Waste reduction budget line and this could drive savings at the disposal end.

The draft QLDC WMMP 2018 directly lifts the goals from the 2010 NZ Waste strategy (NZWS) and uses them as the WMMP goals. Given that the WMMP runs for the next six years we think it is time to move on from this approach.

The 2010 NZWS is a dated document which reflects the focus of the previous Government. The Associate Minister for the Environment holding the waste portfolio has signalled this Government's intention to prioritise waste reduction and minimisation in order to make the shift to circular economy. It makes sense to reflect this intent in the 2018 WMMP document especially if Council intends applying for Waste Minimisation Fund support for infrastructure or other projects over the next six years.

The 2018 Local Government Waste Management Manifesto developed by the TA Forum a 3 sector group of Wasteminz, has as it's number one priority a review of the NZ Waste strategy to set a clear programme for action. It is likely that the document will change substantially from its current form in the next couple of years.

Introduction section of QLDC WMMP 2018 Recommend? Including statement containing the purpose of WMA 2008 alongside an explanation of importance to development of WMMP. This is in line with the QLDC 10 year LTP 2018-28 document p70 vol 2 Table 9 Key to significant infrastructure issues and Implications (Legislation and Guidance) which lists the WMA 2008 as a driver and says QLDC "can show that it is seeking to deliver measurable improvements in solid waste education and management to improve environmental, social and cultural benefits." (We note that this differs from the full purpose of the act in that it leaves out economic benefits, amongst other things.)? Including a paragraph on the community outcomes the WMMP seeks to deliver on as part of the context that has been considered while developing the WMMP. As we understand it these are: ? Communities have a good standard of living and wellbeing? World class landscapes are protected? Environmental sustainability and low impact living is highly valued? Partnering for success? Including a statement detailing importance of zero waste and sustainability for districts brand and reputation as a premier New Zealand destination. ? Adapting the language in the LTP and the WMMP to Solid Waste Minimisation rather than Solid Waste Management. This is in line with the purpose of the Waste Minimisation Act 2008 and will help shift thinking from a managing mindset to a minimisation mindset.

Section 2 Vision goals Objectives and targets Recommend 3 ?Local Government Waste Management Manifesto 2018 Wastebusters submission on QLDC WMMP April 2018

? Swapping out the 2 goals and 4 objectives directly relating to the NZ Waste strategy 2010 and replacing them with a clear, simple 3 tier Reduce, resource recovery, residual waste structure that has the power to drive decision making and investment in the future and creates a simple framework for reporting on what matters.

We support councils vision of working "?towards zero waste and a sustainable district

? ". We consider this vision is strongly aligned with the purpose of the WMA and the community outcomes detailed in the 2018-28 10 year plan. It ties back to councils original decision to commit to working towards Zero Waste in 2003. It also backs the clean, green brand that underpins our districts economy. It is forward thinking in that it aligns well with the renewed focus on creating a circular economy.

It would be useful for the WMMP to contain an outline of what zero waste is and how it supports the districts broader sustainability goals. In our work we use zero waste in three different ways to provide an underlying philosophy, a road map to our destination and a practical toolkit of initiatives. This would connect the vision to both the actions being taken across council through the 10 year plan 2018 and the actions being taken through the WMMP 2018.

We think it would be useful for the WMMP to contain a statement clarifying the stepping stones council intends to use to approach this vision. Waste reduction initiatives help achieve zero waste by reducing waste in absolute terms while waste diversion initiatives help achieve zero waste to landfill which is a different type of goal. It would be useful for council to spell this out tie the vision to the goals and action plan

2.2 Goals Objectives and targets We are suggesting Council has 3 goals rather than 2. Our suggestions for how objectives would align with these is detailed below. We have incorporated the Objectives included in the WMMP and added several that support the Waste reduction goal. We think these are a good fit with the actions contained in the WMMP action plan.

If goals are adapted Suggested adjustments to objectives

Targets It is useful to have clear, specific measurable targets so there is a robust process for assessing progress in relation to the WMMP goals. The way the measure is created is also very important and this needs to be transparent so we can compare apples with apples.

It would also be useful to have a set of consistent measures reported on over the 10 year plan period to give time for any patterns to emerge. We note that reporting measures and formats have changed a number of times over the last 20 years and it is very difficult to get any sort of clear picture of change through time in key indicators from public documents.

We note that the Wasteminz TA Forum have developed a National Waste Data Framework. We encourage QLDC to make sure that data collected and reported is in line with this.

The measures detailed in the WMMP p6 are a good start but there is no consistency across the Waste Assessment, WMMMP and Annual report documents about how these are generated or reported. This is confusing and makes it hard to understand what any given number actually means. It is important that this is clarified and that measures across all public documents are the same or any variation explained. Measure 1 Total waste to landfill? (T/Year) Existing measure adjusted for total volume

The WMMP does not give detail on how the measure will be created. Waste assessment p 16 says measure will be as Measured at Wanaka and Wakatipu transfer stations. This misses the material that by passes the transfer stations and goes direct to Victoria flats landfill - around 13,052 tonne a year (252 tonne x 52 weeks) data from p 9 of WMMP It also misses the sewage sludge being sent to landfill outside the district. Measure 2 Total waste diverted? (T/Year) Existing measure adjusted for total volume Reported kerbside recycling after processing, green waste and recycling drop off.

This measure is confusing as it talks about total waste diverted however the explanation in the Waste Assessment doesn't include material diverted through council contracts via the transfer stations e.g scrap metal etc

The diversion figure in the WMMP p 11 is 13,936 tonnes in or around 30%. It is not clear whether this is all from council contracts or includes private and community operators diverted materials as well e.g. Commercial recycling from Queenstown, Wastebusters recycling and recovered materials and Wanaka Green waste.

The diversion figure in the 10 year plan p102 vol1 is 4,800 tonne or around 14%. It is described as total waste diverted from landfill. We assume this is kerbside collection minus glass sent to landfill plus material diverted via the transfer stations. It is not clear whether this is the case or not. It would be very helpful to include a description of what the measure comprises in the Key Performance Indicator boxes alongside the numbers.

We assume the lower figure is the one that the WMMP measure refers to. We think it would be helpful to include several other measures to give a more rounded picture

and to enable council to show progress in relation to WMMP goals.

Organics? is a key focus so it would be good to include a baseline and report on change from baseline over time as initiatives are put in place.

Contamination? and loss of glass to landfill have been an issue for recycling so it would be helpful to include an Effective Recycling measure to demonstrate progress with the better glass recycling focus. Contamination rate is handy for this. Total material collected - total contamination and material lost to landfill e.g. queenstown glass expressed as a percentage.

Establish a baseline using current data for example total recycling collected 4,417 tonnes minus 2,652 tonnes of glass lost to landfill equals a 40% contamination rate. Then work on improving that in the next tender round.

Tonnes of waste and recovered material per head? per annum are useful measures.. Council has good data on usually resident population and visitor numbers. The data can be shown adjusted for both residents and residents plus visitors on an average day. We think it is useful to continue to report on these because they add detail to the picture. They set waste problems at a human scale which has the power to motivate individuals.

If you are a person committed to working for zero waste it is good to be able to relate your own efforts to the average so you can see if you are above or below the average line. Looking at 35,000 tonnes and rising is demotivating for the average person or business because the scale is too big. It is also very likely that the total waste to landfill will continue to grow over time so there will be no sense of satisfaction from seeing a downward shift while population keeps growing.

There are problems comparing the per head numbers for QLDC with similar data from other places because they do not have the same number of visitors. We should not let that worry

us because we know why they are high. The original per head targets have not been reached because of the glass going to landfill and the building boom but this is not a good reason to abandon them.

To get people excited about waste reduction, reuse and recycling you need to give them regular feedback on how they are going. It would be useful for QLDC to think about which data they collect that they could regularly share to help keep residents motivated and engaged. A strong feedback loop will help to motivate and inspire people to do more.

The 2011 WMMP had ten measures to report on however we are not aware of any public reporting on these and no comments have been made in the 2018 waste assessment or WMMP to indicate whether they were achieved or not.

We note there are no measures that relate to reduction goals in the WMMP. We recommend that council develops at least one relevant reduction measure.

Measure 3 Consent Compliance (%) Existing measure Landfill and transfer station consents. Useful for reporting adverse effects of activities

Measure 4 Customer Satisfaction (%) Existing measure % satisfied in Annual ratepayer survey. Gross indication of satisfaction with services available in the district

The WMMP states that the adopted programme will determine the targets. However we were not able to see any clear statements about what these might be. The

discussion around the benefits of Programme 6 estimates around 19% reduction in waste to landfill over ten years. We are assuming clearly defined targets relating to programme 6 will be developed once the preferred programme has been signed off.

Comments on WMMP section 5. Councils Roles

We support the Bold Leadership approach taken by Mike Theelan and Jim Boult in the 10 Year Plan and their 30 year infrastructure horizon. However we think further work needs to be done to align the proposed Waste Minimisation and Management Plan with this bold approach. With a \$29m capital works budget and a \$145m operating budget, waste minimisation is a big ticket item that deserves the same dramatic shift in thinking that has been applied to other infrastructure line items.

The visitor and resident population of the district is growing fast. Equally, the operating environment for resource recovery and waste management is changing fast. We need to design resource recovery centres and transfer stations so they are flexible and able to adapt as the wider operating environment and our community's diversion rate changes over time.

We agree with Peter Hansby that: "?Providing education and quality alternatives that encourage positive behaviour changes will be a fundamental part of any future approach.

We urge council to invest time and energy in engaging with the community on the big picture issues around waste minimisation throughout the 6 year life of the WMMP as a way to harness public energy and enthusiasm for reduction and zero waste.

A key role council can play is supporting the development of a varied, competitive, mixed economy of service providers in the district. Our district is growing fast and there are big changes coming in our industry. A diverse sector will be more resilient and interested in innovating to fill niche opportunities as they arise than a single monopoly operator.

We would like to see council get involved in a wider range of partnerships and supportive relationships to leverage the existing activity of community and private operators active in the waste minimisation space. This would benefit both parties and ensure that valued services are sustainable. There may also be new opportunities where council could become involved in creative ways to give new or existing operators a hand up. This approach could deliver WMMP goals without council having to pay the full cost.

Examples include; ? Wastebusters operates a community resource recovery facility serving the Wanaka community at no cost to council. We'd like to explore options for working in partnership with Council to achieve more. ? The Wanaka Green Waste site could divert more organic material if it had support from council. It may be more effective to focus on supporting this operation to be open for longer hours or more days a week instead of providing a parallel service for Greenwaste 50 metres away at the Wanaka transfer station. ? The Hawea Community Drop off point is very well used and this creates issues with monitoring and servicing frequency. The community have indicated they would be willing to explore creative options for taking care of the drop off. This could be by pulling it back into the Hawea Green Waste depot.

QLDC has reached the point where we need to change to a different operating model to enable a higher level of resource recovery. Council has earmarked a significant amount of investment money for Capex over the next ten years. We would like to see most of that money spent on assets that enable resource recovery rather than residual waste handling..

Issues with the current infrastructure? Transfer stations and recycling centres operate as separate entities and have different drivers so it is hard to divert material once it has arrived at the transfer station site or to create price incentives to divert recoverable material. We are pleased council is exploring options to change this.? In Wanaka the Transfer station, Wastebusters and The Green Waste depot all operate independently. They are all accessed through the same gateway. It would be valuable to explore ways of integrating the three from a customer perspective to divert more material. This would be especially useful for visitors who find it confusing. Wastebusters submission on QLDC WMMP April 2018

? Processing site for kerbside material is on Glenda Drive which is a high value site and could be better used as a customer facing resource recovery centre integrated with the adjacent transfer station. We would like to see the processing plant moved to an out of town site e.g. at the Victoria flats landfill so it can expand to meet demand and have plenty of space to store materials awaiting shipping e.g. bales of product and colour separated glass for bottle to bottle recycling.

QLDC's current asset base is focused on the transfer stations. Resource Recovery Parks and Community Recycling Centres are the new normal. Auckland Council is leading the way in establishing a Resource Recovery network across the city. It would be very useful for QLDC to take a whole system approach when considering how to get best value from it's investments in recovery infrastructure across the district.

There is some confusion over what services are supplied by council and what is provided by independent operators. This flows through into the 10 year plan and WMMP documents. We think it would be really useful for council to clearly map out the current resource recovery and waste handling network. With the 2018-19 RFP process looming any confusion could result in perverse outcomes.

Waste levy funds returned to council are very likely to increase over time. We suggest that council allocates 50% of new funding coming into this pool to supporting reduction initiatives and investments that manage the shift across to new recovery methodologies. Council could commit in advance to allocating a percentage of this stream to particular activities. We suggest the other 50% goes to Education, Engagement and Communication work. This is in line with council's approach to other infrastructure development timeframes that speed up or slow down depending on the flow of external funds due to Central Government decisions.

Council role as Financer - Capex and infrastructure projects We fully support council's intention to invest strategically in resource recovery and waste infrastructure across the district. We note that council has budgets of \$29m over the ten year term for this. It appears that \$22.5m of this will be spent in Queenstown and \$6.4m in Wanaka. \$18.1m will be spent on infrastructure to support collecting and handling rubbish. Just over half that \$10.8m will be spent on infrastructure to support collecting and processing recycling. It appears that almost none of the recycling infrastructure budget will be spent in Wanaka.

We do not agree that the current capex allocation supports achievement of council's vision and strategic objectives. It fails to create the powerful driver we need

to take us towards zero waste and a sustainable district as envisioned in Councils 2018 Waste Minimisation and Management plan.

To increase the proportion of material recycled we need to prioritise investment in resource recovery infrastructure. Infrastructure has a long life, the infrastructure strategy has a 30 year timeframe. We need to be building the infrastructure we are going to need in the future rather than rebuilding the infrastructure we used in the past. We need to prioritise resource

recovery facilities and customer facing recovery sites so our district is on the front foot in the years to come.

The Statement of financial performance in the 10 year plan 2018/19 to 2028/29 shows waste management operational spend increasing steadily over time. LTP figures show operating expenditure doubling from \$9.4m 2017/18 to \$18.1m 2028/29. Population is projected to increase by about 30% over the same time. It looks like ratepayers will have to pay more in the future for services than they do now.

We note that Waste related OPex is about 10% of annual spending but it requires only \$5 in each hundred of rates revenue. We are assuming waste activities are about 50% funded through user pays mechanisms. We would like to see user pays mechanisms funding as many waste activities as there is a viable revenue stream for.

User pays is a valuable tool for driving waste reduction. People and businesses that make less waste and less recycling should pay less. The producer pays principle is well established as an economic instrument to drive change in our industry. Fair allocation of resources across the district As both Wanaka and Queenstown residents pay the same landfill levy and targeted Waste Management Charge, we think it is fair to have a level playing field across the district in provision of services. The Infrastructure spending outlines in the LTP favours Queenstown as detailed above.

There are two points we think are relevant: Growth projections taken from the LTP document shows average day population growth in the Wanaka ward at 31% over ten years, Queenstown shows as 27%. It appears that Wanaka is growing faster than Queenstown. The WMMP actions list and the Capex budget have upgrading the Queenstown site to deal with rapid growth as a key priority. We think this the same attention needs to be applied to Wanaka to help it cope with growth.

The same data set shows that the Wanaka peak day population spikes much higher than Queenstown. Wanaka peak day in 2018 is 127% greater than average In 2028 it is projected to be 123% above average day population. Queenstown Peak day population is only 66% higher than average day at both ends of the decade. This suggests that Wanaka facilities are under as much or more pressure as Queenstown's

We think council should carefully assess any spending on asset development to take this information into account. At the moment it seems there is an assumption that Queenstown facilities are under a lot more pressure than Wanakas (which are less than half the size). The fact that a lot of waste from Queenstown goes direct to landfill instead of through the transfer station also reduces pressure on the Queenstown facility.

There is a gap in service provision as Council does not provide a resource recovery centre for Wanaka residents. This is provided independently by Wastebusters. It would

be good to

explore options for investing in making the current shared site access and traffic flows more functional as part of the district wide asset upgrade process and for creating a fair approach to funding drop off services for residents and visitors.

There is some confusion in the LTP and WMMP documents around how facilities and services work. To clarify we note the following: ? It is our understanding that the land, buildings, services and supporting infrastructure were provided by Council for the Wakatipu Recycling centre on Glenda drive rather than being built under a BOOT contract by the Contractor and that the contractor supplied the machinery and equipment used for processing. ? LTP document Vol 2 P146 "Activity Recycling. The purpose of this activity is to provide ?(refuse)sic

? recycling services throughout the district. This includes the operation of resource recovery centres in Queenstown and Wanaka." Council does not operate a Resource recovery centre in Wanaka. Wastebusters has a lease for the site which is owned by council. Wastebusters owns all the improvements on the Ballantyne road site.

The landfill We think we should be worrying more about the preserving the void space in the landfill. Worst case predictions are its full in 2049, best case that it could last as long as 2074. The landfill is not like other assets it won't wear out and become a liability the longer we keep it open. 2049 is on the edge of the 30 year Infrastructure planning horizon. If we don't make some serious changes we will have to have a new landfill option consented and ready to go in 30 years. Avoiding unnecessary costs will help us get best value over the whole of this assets life.

Advocacy We fully support Council promoting and using it's lobbying power at national level to address waste management issues which are outside councils direct control.

Wastebusters supports Queenstown Lakes District Council partnering with other councils and interested parties to advocate for the introduction of tools which would help to shift the operating landscape in favour of increased waste reduction. We believe councils working together at the national level will be very effective in driving change.

The TA forum, which is a Wasteminz Sector group, has developed the ?Local Government Waste Management Manifesto 2018?. This details 5 key actions that could be taken by Central Government to create a supportive operating environment for councils.

The 5 key initiatives have been agreed by by the TA forum as having the most impact to set NZ on the right path towards a circular economy are: 1. Reviewing the NZ Waste strategy and setting a clear programme for action 2. Expanding the waste disposal levy and progressively raising the levy rate 3. Officially adopt and implement the National Waste Data Framework 4. Introduce a container deposit scheme to lift recycling rates

5. Declare tyres, e-waste, agricultural chemicals and plastics as priority products

These actions would enable real reductions in waste to landfill and reduce the costs borne by QLDC and our communities. Benefits include: reduction on Greenhouse gas emissions, more competitive industries and services, improved soil quality, less reliance on imports, reduced risk from fluctuating commodity markets, Increase in economic activity and satisfying jobs, more diverse economy.

QLDC has substantial lobbying power and we would like to see this deployed in the service of the TA forums Manifesto at all levels and through a range of channels via elected representatives and officers.

The change of government has shifted Central Government's focus back onto tools available through the WMA 2008 to drive recovery and reduction. It is very likely that key provisions of the WMA 2008 that have the power to drive waste minimisation will be implemented if the Government feels it has the local government and community support to do so.

These include; Waste levy? - broadening the scope and increasing the charges year on year. In 2009 the NZ Government introduced a \$10 per tonne levy to waste going into class 1 landfills. However this rate is too low to drive waste reduction and the Levy applies to class 1 landfills which only attract 30% of NZ's waste. The other 70% goes into class 2-4 landfills or is disposed of in farm pits.

The Waste Levy is the most powerful tool we have to reduce waste. International evidence from UK, Europe and Australia supports the case that extending and increasing the the levy will reduce waste and increase diversion rates. ?NZ research? showed there would be multiple benefits from a well designed levy regime. The study suggests extending the levy to all classes of landfill and raising it progressively to \$140 a tonne.

The levy does two jobs. It creates a pool of capital to invest in recovery and reduction activities at the council and national levels. It will also increase the per tonne cost to landfill which enables the commercial development of alternatives as they become economically viable.

Around 50% of waste levy funds are distributed to Councils to use for local waste minimisation initiatives. As the levy rate increases QLDC's share of the levy funds would increase creating a new pool of uncommitted revenue to apply to new initiatives and waste minimisation infrastructure.

Product stewardship schemes? - It is very likely that mandatory product stewardship schemes will be put in place for tyres, e- waste and electronics, agricultural chemicals and plastics and other products that are problematic at the end of their life span sooner rather than later. These will require infrastructure that supports the takeback process and are likely to include some form of advance disposal fee component to cover end of life recycling costs.

Container deposit schemes - ?mandatory schemes covering glass, cans and plastic containers are likely to be established. This will create a user pays mechanism to cover the cost of dealing with visitor and resident recycling. It will also create an incentive to return bottles and cans to claim the refund which will reduce littering and reduce the flows of materials going through public space recycling bins.

A container deposit scheme would be of major benefit to our district, as it creates a user pays mechanism that shifts the cost from the ratepayer onto the producer and the consumer. This would take some of the pressure of funding recycling off our ratepayer base, by providing a mechanism to pay for the recycling of cans and bottles emptied by our many visitors.

Review the NZ Waste Strategy? - NZ lacks a clear strategy to guide action and investment. The NZ Waste strategy 2010 has no goals, targets, actions, timetables or responsibilities. The strategy needs to be revised to develop a comprehensive action programme.

This would clarify Government's priorities and time frames, help align councils WMMPs with national priorities, guide strategic investment of Waste Levy funds, encourage joint working and regional planning, create certainty for private sector investment in infrastructure and services. Adopt the National Waste Data Framework? developed? by Wasteminz? and implement to enable better planning and monitoring at local, regional and national levels

Community leadership We would like to see QLDC leading the way by monitoring and reporting on the performance of its own operational activities in relation to waste reduction and diversion activities. It would be great to see council establish a baseline, come up with some strategies and tell the story of how it is working for zero waste internally. This could be extended over time to cover all council operational activities and facilities.

We know council offices and facilities do a pretty good job of recycling in Wanaka so it could be a low hanging fruit that gives Council a good news story to tell. It would be a great way to get residents and business people on board with the WMMP and build confidence in Council's ability to Walk the Talk.

Strategic procurement QLDC is looking for innovative, affordable ways to deliver on its ambitious work programme. Council can show bold leadership by taking a strategic approach to procurement. Aligning broader council goals, such as a more diverse economy, inclusive communities, environmental sustainability and wellbeing with public spending on contracts and infrastructure will deliver multiple benefits from each dollar spent.

Partnering for success and learning from other bold communities is integral to Bold Leadership. Auckland Council has put a lot of thought and resources into developing a strategic approach to procuring Waste minimisation and management services. Wastebusters submission on QLDC WMMP April 2018

Auckland Council has moved away from considering cost as the sole driver when it comes to procurement. They successfully run strategic procurement processes that allow them to consider long term outcomes and wider benefits generated through contract work to deliver best value..

The concept of 'best value' can be understood as the optimum combination of whole of life cost and fitness for purpose. Best value provides a useful way thinking about what you are trying to achieve through your purchasing decisions. Efficiency based processes tend to focus on the short term economic cost of doing a job expressed as the price of a contract, often the goal is to find the lowest price per unit.

The problem with this approach is it encourages a 'race to the bottom', contractors look for ways to externalise cost and internalise profit and the game becomes: ?How can I do the least work for the least money?

? Both the price and the service are shaved in a drive to offer a tender that barely meets the service objectives.

Auckland Council also use an innovative approach to partnering to get more bang for their buck. This enables them to deliver economic, environmental, social and cultural benefits as part of their Waste Minimisation plan implementation process. Their approach is in line with the Waste Minimisation Act 2008 which encourages a reduction in the amount of waste we generate and dispose of to reduce the environmental harm of waste and provide environmental, economic, social and cultural benefits.

It is also in line with with the Local Government Act 2002 which requires councils to take a sustainable approach when procuring goods, services and works. Sustainable Procurement has the most positive environmental, community and economic impacts on a whole of life basis and creates value and legacy. This includes:

? value for money over whole of life ? minimising environmental impacts over whole of life ? strategies to avoid unnecessary consumption, manage demand and minimise waste ? social responsibility of suppliers including obligations to employees ? obligations under the Treaty of Waitangi ? where appropriate working with local communities and organisations for specific outcomes

Strategic procurement is a useful tool for making sure council is partnering with and procuring from enterprises and organisations that share council's goals. Community and social enterprises who are purpose driven can be very good partners and service providers for council as they can enable council to tick several boxes at once. Commercial operators can also deliver on Councils outcomes and broader goals where these are specified clearly in the RFP and contract documents.

Strategic procurement enables Council to spend on activities and outputs and deliver on service level outcomes, community outcomes and create broader value using the same

contract budget. A public benefit model for strategic procurement measures success in terms of outcomes for people rather than short term cost savings and creates a race to the top by encouraging innovation and a focus on benefits.

In the public benefit model effectiveness of outcomes is assessed in terms of their benefit to users and the community; and the service providers are encouraged to co-operate and innovate to maximise these benefits, rather than compete to minimise costs.

The onus is on the service providers to demonstrate the value of their approach in their tender, showing how positive social, environmental and economic outcomes will accrue for the service users and the wider community.

The model stimulates innovation amongst all the providers to achieve the key local priorities of Council. It also puts the wider impacts of each provider at the centre of the tendering process. Rather than being incentivised to meet minimum environmental or social standards in service delivery, they are incentivised to maximise the social and environmental benefits in the presentation of the tender itself. Thus added value is seen as a core component and weighted accordingly so that desirable outcomes become part of the feedback loop.

Auckland Council faces similar problems to QLDC with rapid growth and demand for infrastructure and services. They have developed a strategic procurement approach to make sure council makes the best use of every dollar spent.

This is especially important for recycling contracts which are reasonably complex to put together. Complexity increases with a long supply chain so the more players involved the more opportunity there can be to pass the buck when things don't work as expected.

QLDC recycling contracts have not delivered the service level outcomes expected in Queenstown with all glass going to landfill and there are issues with rural drop off servicing levels and a decrease in the amount of glass being sent to bottle to bottle recycling in Wanaka. QLDC's 2015-2016 kerbside collection data set shows glass recycling down by 208 tonnes, commingled recycling up by a similar amount which would suggest that about a third of the glass collected in Wanaka also travels through the Queenstown MRF and ends up going to landfill. The services have not proven to be efficient or effective.

It is important that QLDC gains a sound understanding of why the system in place has failed to deliver at this basic level. It may be useful to work through similar steps to Auckland Council in the early stages of developing the scope and approach for the 2018-19 tender round so that our communities can have confidence in the services provided in the years to come and we will be able to deliver on WMMP goals.

Key factors from Auckland Council Procurement strategy and policy Auckland council went through a process and developed a specific procurement strategy for Waste Management and Minimisation Implementation. This was based on the guidance Council has put together. 4

Auckland Council recognises that procurement is a long process that flows right through from 10 year plan, Annual Plan and community board agreement processes to the acquisition and delivery of goods, works and services.

Auckland Councils 6 principles 1. Work together - to achieve best value, i.e. the optimum combination of whole of life cost and fitness for purpose. Seek to deliver the best outcome for council and the community. 2. Value te Ao Maori - Support councils commitment to Maori including responsibilities under Te Tiriti o Waitangi. 3. Be sustainable – procurement practice enables active consideration of social, environmental, cultural and economic interests of the community including impacts on current and future generations. 4. Act Fairly - ethical, lawful and consider the needs of all groups in the community. Open and contestable processes, all potential suppliers have equal access. 5. Make the best use of every dollar – focus on effectiveness to identify and deliver on multiple benefits for every dollar spent. Council actively seeks innovative approaches. 4 ? Auckland Council Procurement Policy Auckland Council Procurement Strategy Wastebusters submission on QLDC WMMP April 2018

6. Be Affordable - Seek best possible value for the whole of the lifecycle, does not necessitate selection of the lowest price. Encourage and maintain a sustainable and diverse marketplace to ensure a competitive market is maintained. Maintain appropriate balance between quality and short and long term costs. 7. Council teams review the procurement principles at the business case development stage, to see which principles and policy objectives should form part of the procurement process. This helps them determine specifications and relative weighting of factors included in the tender evaluation process. This specific procurement strategy is used as a basis for the briefing summaries supplied to Industry and community in the lead up to REOI and RFP processes.

Auckland Council has a strong desire to see procurement positively benefit local communities where the works, services and supplies are delivered. This local impact is concerned with positive contributions to: 1. A local communities capacity to do things for itself (skills, social capital and knowledge) and participate in decisions 2. The health, resilience and sustainability of the local economy with the multiplier effect an important consideration.

We suggest that QLDC consider its own procurement process in the light of the Auckland Council example and see whether there is anything useful that can be learned from it. We suggest that QLDC reviews its procurement policy and strategy to make sure it is aligned with current best practice.

Priorities Organics We support councils intention to focus on diverting organics from Landfill. We agree this will have a multiple benefits.

We also think it would be useful to explore options for minimising the amount of paper and cardboard that is still going to landfill. We note that initiatives in the WMMP aim to address this stream e.g. by exploring differential pricing mechanisms to shift material from waste to recovery streams. Looking at the layout of the Transfer stations and the recovery parks. Promotion and education could also support this.

Glass As council has acknowledged in the Ten Year Plan, the district's current kerbside recycling system has failed. Glass picked up for recycling in Queenstown has been going to landfill since May 2016. Ineffective recycling systems destroy resident and visitor confidence in our districts services, compromise our clean, green brand and demotivate service users. The current situation where 2,652 tonnes out of the 4,500 (est) collected ends up in the landfill is totally unacceptable. It's not

efficient or effective.

We believe that our district can do better, and we acknowledge and support the commitment by QLDC in the Ten Year Plan to do so. Fixing the problem is not simply a matter of throwing more money at recycling. We need to look seriously at whole of life cost and make sure the systems we invest in are actually fit for purpose and will meet the needs of our communities.

Just copying the Wanaka kerbside model won't solve the problem either. Councils collection data from 2015-16 shows 200+ tonne or about 35% of Wanaka glass ending up in the commingled collection which would result in it going to landfill too. The key thing is to design the collection and processing systems to make sure the recyclable materials meet the specs of the end user of the products recovered.

Recycling glass back into bottles in our district can be done. All the glass recycled with Wastebusters from events, businesses and drop-offs in both Wanaka and Alexandra is made back into bottles at the O-I factory in Auckland. The system works because we handle glass in a way which makes it a useful material to O-I (we keep it separate to other recycling materials to reduce contamination and we sort it into green, brown and clear to suit their colouring process).

Future council contracts need to lock in effective outcomes for services so that kerbside recycling from our district can be a valuable input into a new production process instead of going to landfill. Recycling only starts at the kerbside for it to work you have to consider the effects of the system on the products right through the supply chain.

Education and community engagement We do not think Council will be able to deliver on it's WMMP goals with the current level of emphasis on reduction, education, promotion of services and community engagement. Option 6 aims to deliver the status quo for educational work. We would like to see Council find a way to increase this line item steadily over time.

There is very little likelihood of council increasing diversion or reducing waste beyond the status quo without investing in more in communicating and engaging residents and visitors in programmes and services. Investing more in reduction and behaviour change today could save us big bucks in the future.

It is easier to stomach the spending when you consider the investments businesses make in advertising and marketing to shift behaviour in favour of their products and services. 1-3% of budget just isn't going to get us where we need to be in a district with fast churn visitors who all need to know how to use the services while they're here. To succeed we need to make sure everyone who arrives in our district to live or to visit is on board and working for zero waste every day. We need to show them that waste reduction and resource recovery are what we do here to look after our place and our people.

To change behaviour you have to win hearts and minds and that takes communication through a wide range of channels. We would like to see council commit ?at least

? 50% of any additional waste levy funding it receives to waste reduction and education initiatives.

We support the council's commitment to continuing funding of the Enviroschools, Zero Waste education in schools and Dr Compost projects (including their subsidy on composting systems), which Wastebusters deliver on behalf of council. We acknowledge that we have received funding from council through a small contract to support our delivery of these programmes since 2007 and we appreciate This contribution to our work.

These projects have successfully helped many residents to reduce their household rubbish, and contributed to environmental and waste education in our district's schools. We would like to see funding of this work at least keep pace with population growth.

We have worked on the Love Food Hate Waste Project driven by Wasteminz since it was started and we appreciate councils support of this project. We would like to see QLDC take a more proactive role in supporting Wasteminz initiatives now that there are staff resources in house to enable this. They are putting together a Reduce, Reuse, Recycle project now and it would be great to see QLDC providing cash and in kind support.

Cleanfills and farm Pits Research on waste generation across New Zealand indicates that only 21% of waste is going into class 1 landfills. 28% is recovered. 25% goes into clean fills and 9% into farm pits.

This could be a big legacy issue for QLDC in years to come. With rapid development todays farm pit or clean fill site is tomorrow's subdivision. The WMMP has an action to maintain a watching brief on cleanfills we think it would be useful to invest in getting a good understanding of where these are and what is going into them so Council can be proactive in managing them. It is very likely that more waste is going into unmanaged clean fills and farm pits than into the Victoria Flats landfill.

It would be useful for QLDC to get a handle on other significant waste streams in the district. Other regions have done comprehensive surveys and research into waste flows and farm waste. It would be useful to work with ORC and other Otago councils to do a similar project in Otago.

We think that Blue bags for rubbish ?should remain an option. User pays is a very good driver for waste reduction. The district has stuck with a user pays approach to rubbish for many years and we are now seeing other districts and cities coming back to this model. Blue bags are a fair way of allocating cost to people who do not make very much rubbish. We think it is fair that those who create less rubbish pay less. Part B Initiatives Useful to number initiatives so there is a shorthand way of knowing whether everyone is talking about the same thing.

Background information about Wastebusters structure and funding:

Wanaka Wastebusters Limited is a community enterprise with charitable status. Wastebusters is owned by the members of the Friends of Wanaka Wastebusters Incorporated. Council has granted a 35 year peppercorn rental lease to Wastebusters to occupy the site adjacent to the transfer station on Ballantyne road. Wastebusters has developed the site over 18 years and owns all the improvements. Wastebusters covers all the operational costs associated with running the site from its own revenue streams. Wastebusters delivers a small Education Contract for council funded through the Waste Levy allocation which contributes to the cost of

Enviroschools, Zero Waste education in schools and Dr Compost. This is the only funding Wastebusters receives from council.

Wastebusters fully and independently funds all of the reuse or recycling services delivered to our community from the Wanaka site, which include: ? Public access to reuse shop and recycling services, 363 days a year. ? Commercial recycling collection services for 300+ businesses across the district? Events recycling and rubbish services for large, medium and small events, including Wanaka A&P show (40,000 visitors), Warbirds over Wanaka (50,000 visitors), Rhythm and Alps (10,000 visitors)? Recycling drop off service for residents, businesses and visitors, for household materials plus e-waste, polystyrene, shrink wrap, used engine oil, fluorescent tubes? Reuse drop off service for donated goods, and free moving on pick up service? 24 hour 'after hours' recycling drop off service for residents and visitors? Workshops including upcycling and repair culture? Sponsorship and support of community waste reduction initiatives, schools and community groups including Plastic Bag Free Wanaka

Wastebusters also operates a resource recovery centre in Alexandra delivering similar services and holds a small contract with CODC to run and collect from drop off sites at townships across the district (Ranfurly, Roxburgh, Tarras, Oturehua, Poolburn, Omakau and Patearoa.

Wastebusters is an active member of the Zero Waste Network and has been involved in a number of nationwide projects including: Unpackit good and bad packaging Awards, TV Takeback, Love Food, Hate Waste.

Submission from Solutions Using Renewable Energy (SURE) Global Waste Management QLDC Ten Year Plan 2018-2028

This submission is on behalf of SURE Global (www.sure.com.ph and https://www.facebook.com/sureincph/) by Mawhinney & Co.

We have been approached by SURE Global to help investigate the feasibility of developing a "Wasteto-Worth" project in Queenstown. Waste-to-worth technologies are consistent with the Council's vision expressed in its Waste Management and Minimisation Plan (WMMP).

SURE Global's origins go back to 2004, when SURE, Inc was founded in the Philippines. The company has since expanded its activities in the Middle East, Africa, India, Europe, and the US. Its passion originates from a shared vision among its founders who have spent significant portions of their professional careers in the environment and energy sectors.

SURE Global aims to develop projects converting waste to worth. The company's capabilities include project development, technology selection, engineering, construction, operation, and maintenance. The company operates on a build-own-operate-transfer (BOOT) model including project conceptualization, design, integration, operation and maintenance (O&M), and transfer. SURE Global establishes special purpose companies (SPCs) where the SURE Group retains ownership. Each SPC serves as the project development company that manages project implementation, including financing, construction, and O&M of the facilities. The attached PowerPoint presentation prepared by Dr Vikram Pattarkine gives an overview of SURE Global's activities.

Our submission is as follows:

1. The draft Ten Year Plan anticipates funding for several projects in the near future including the Recycling Centre plant upgrade; Transfer Station upgrades in Wanaka and Wakatipu, and a Gas Capture facility at Victoria Flats landfill site. SURE Global seeks an opportunity to meet with the Council so that their advice regarding the possibility of converting waste to worth can be considered before capital expenditure is incurred. 2. The Council's Waste Management and Minimisation Plan identifies the Council's vision, goals, objectives, targets, and methods for achieving effective and efficient waste management and minimisation. The options considered for managing solid waste, however, do not include consideration of waste-to-worth technologies. We request council introduce a three bin waste management system as provided by many South Island Local Authorities. The zero waste ideal put forward at the time of the last long term plan is no closer to happening now as when it was proposed around 2008.

Having a three bin system does not necessarily mean it will encourage more waste but will channel waste currently going to the landfill to alternate use. If it is still desirable to separate glass from other recyclables (as is the current practise in Wanaka), two recycling bins can be deployed or the current black bins can be used for glass and a wheelie bin provided for other recyclables. Submission to QLDC re: WMMP from Esther Whitehead, on behalf of Sustainable Queenstown Charitable Trust

SQCT is thrilled that QLDC has fulfilled requests we made about waste management and minimization over the last couple of years; particularly SQCT's request for greater transparency over practices around waste, as well as employing a Waste Minimisation Planner. Please understand that SQCT is here to support both our community and our council, we see great alignment with QLDC's vision and SQCT's vision. SQCT is supportive of the priorities focused on glass and organic waste.

Please note that the three key projects SQCT is focusing on for 2018/19 are:

- 1. Sustainable Tourism Research Project in conjunction with QLDC and SBN. The scope of this project is to work with the local business sector to establish opportunities and challenges for operating more environmentally sustainably through consultancy, collaboration and education. The mechanism in which to do this is The Kiwi Pledge being launched by AirNZ and THL.
- 2. Event Waste Avoidance and Minimisation, in collaboration with Luma, Winterfest and QLDC. This framework and delivery model allows massive reduction and avoidance of waste to landfill since QLD has so many big events that have to date, created massive waste streams.
- 3. Food Surplus Re-distribution in collaboration with Kiwi Harvest, Rehab and a number of local food operators, supermarkets and Charitable Agencies such as Happiness House and Salvation Army. Organic Food waste is a huge issue, currently commercial food waste is not being addressed in our district.

SQCT's 'business as usual' is working with our community, offering educational

workshops, events and forums on reducing waste, and learning about environmental issues such as Climate Change, Plastic Pollution, and a Carbon Dependent Economy whilst providing solutions at an individual level, and business level through a community led approach.

It is clear that SQCT is already advocating for much the same as QLDC, and that we have a solid and trusted voice in our community and district. We work with other experts, scientists, and community groups to engage and educate our community on conservation, waste minimization/management, economy and public health.

SQCT had a meeting with Sophie Mander and Deborah Lind on 3rd April 2018, this meeting proved to be useful for understanding some of the more complex issues faced by QLDC and the reasons for QDLC's emphasis on the prioritisation of Glass and Organics.

SQCT suggests three key priorities lacking in the current draft WMMP which should be positively acknowledged and addressed with some realistic outcomes mapped over time:

- 1. Education and Learning Opportunities need more emphasis and a greater budget from QLDC over the LTP. The current \$90K is unable to create real educational value to our community, and the status quo is inefficient and only reaching the few.
- 2. Collaboration: Creation of an advisory group, made up of QLDC and ORC, Community Groups, a variety of industry and businesses with an interest in managing waste. QLDC facilitates the group's meetings, which are held four times a year. The purpose is to support collaborative means to reduce and manage waste through a possible contestable fund (Construction waste is an example -which is massive but QLDC is unable to manage alone).
- 3. Procurement: The Waste Minimisation Planner to work more closely with the QLDC Contracts Manager around procurement of contracts for 2019 and beyond, which address the failure we have seen in previous contracts to incentivize good practice by Waste Service Providers. Governance of these contracts should be clear in the WMMP -further investigating demand and cost effectiveness of services and options.

Some general notes and questions:

SQCT does not agree with QLDC's sentiment that our community is especially interested in glass recycling over and above other waste streams. Rather SQCT sees this interest as a reflection of a community being educated on what is happening with our current waste streams. SQCT speculates that if our community were aware of many other practices around waste, then, they would be equally interested. Our community has changed from a decade ago, it seeks greater transparency and communications from QLDC.

The draft WMMP makes no mention of 'Circular Economy' in any of the language/rhetoric, this needs to be part of an Educational Policy- where community and business understand that what we each put in our bins can be a valuable commodity. Little serious thought has gone into closing these resource loops. Support must be provided to help industry with 'better' supply chains, this can only begin to be addressed when it is understood. We will also need more clever technology to separate materials quickly and efficiently for recycling.

Retailer Responsibility: Responsibility for consumer-related waste/recycling shouldn't fall entirely on consumer shoulders (or indirectly on the ratepayer, i.e. end consumer. Retailers that sell products/food with a shortterm packaging (post-conusmer packaging), could pay a fee representative of their sales. Example: Public Bins and

our beaches are full of Fergburger, Patagonia, etc, the responsibility for their 'externalities' can be put back with them through greater product stewardship through Education.

Possible levy on visitors to QLD. A visitor levy has been discussed by the QLDC in terms of bed tax. The levy could incorporate a component which supports the collection of waste produced by our visitors as well as a budget to REDUCE waste produced by visitors.

SQCT is shocked by the assumption QLDC makes around a decrease in construction waste; "the construction sector may slow down whereas organics will continue to grow" This assumption is ridiculous when all evidence is projecting growth in the district. If it can't be a priority now, it must be addressed as an ongoing priority now, which QLDC will make a positive statement on realistic outcomes rather than merely 'council would support' the business and community sector.

Procurement: In New Zealand a waste management service contract is usually an adapted version of a civil engineering contract, this raises a number of questions:

Why are many City Councils still relying on a contract form that is not designed for our industry, when it is becoming less and less relevant and requires so much adaptation to be used?

What does a waste management service contract look like for 2019?

Is the way the sector has become used to procuring services in the QLD necessarily resulting in the best outcome, SQCT would like to know more about procurement and exisiting contracts and motivations/incentives.

Alternative Procurement Processes:

Public procurement processes in the UK are extremely tightly controlled by the Government and by European Union Rules. The four methods available for waste management contracts are open, restricted, negotiated, and competitive dialogue procedures. SQCT would like to see some of the management processes of Waste Contracts presented in the WMMP. Much of our past to present bad practice has been due to poor contractual arrangements, therefore all good practice spent on community education is lost if service providers are unable to fulfill community desires. The community can no longer feel duped.

Given the current and on-going tourism and related construction booms, I don't think just focusing on recycling glass and organics goes far enough, although each of those is very important and it's great that improvements to these areas are being worked on. The building industry produces high volumes of waste and is renowned for a culture of not often voluntarily putting a focus on how to be economical with it, dispose of it or even use "greener" materials in the first place. Building codes are routinely treated as a maximum, not minimum standard. I do not trust that this is an industry that will voluntarily and enthusiastically reduce it's own waste without being assisted and regulated. It has a lot of resources in the area and is benefiting greatly from the current boom. Why should this industry be let off the hook? I also do not agree that the building boom will necessarily die down in the short to medium term. Queenstown is a very particular and unique sub-economy within New Zealand and the building boom is linked to our tourism sector, which does not show any signs of abating on it's growth. If nothing is done quickly to target this sector during this ongoing boom then the amount of waste continuing to go straight to landfill from this sector will be immense and very significant in relation to the amounts from households.

Draft Waste Minimisation and Management Plan 2018 - Submission Summary

The draft Waste Minimisation and Management Plan 2018 was publically consulted during 23 March – 30 April 2018 alongside supporting information including the QLDC Waste Assessment and Solid Waste Analysis.

Submissions and Online Survey

An online survey and feedback form was used to support the submission process. 199 completed submissions were received. The online survey was largely supportive of Councils preferred programme proposed in the draft WMMP. Including;

- 82% of respondents agree with QLDC's preferred focus on recycling and glass services
- 75% of respondents would use a kerbside collection service for garden and food waste
- 99% of respondents support a change of approach to glass collection in the district
- 95% of respondents would like to see more information and education about waste minimisation

To help consider the feedback as discussed in the submissions, the draft WMMP 'Action Plan' has been inserted below. It has been updated to include the level of support identified in the submissions and includes officer comments.

Actions identified in the submissions that are not covered in the draft plan include; establish a community contestable fund for waste minimisation initiatives, establish an advisory group of local government, industry, business and community to support waste minimisation initiatives, provide regulatory tools to minimise single-use plastics and provide recycling opportunities for soft plastics, polystyrene and textiles.

Submission feedback also includes suggestions to; measure progress, improve reporting mechanisms, more clearly identify funding and encourage greater community engagement in progress of the plan. Suggestions include framing the actions in a way that supports the waste hierarchy and encourages community engagement. This has been used in the covering report to help review the submission feedback;

- 1. Waste Reduction Reducing waste at source
- 2. Resource Recovery Diverting waste from landfill
- 3. Waste Disposal Collecting, transporting and disposing of waste in landfill. Reducing harm from waste disposal
